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7 **SENATE RESOLUTION**

8 TO ENCOURAGE THE STATE OF ARKANSAS TO REFRAIN FROM  
9 CONTRACTING WITH COMPANIES OR ENTITIES THAT BENEFIT  
10 FROM UYGHUR FORCED LABOR.

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13 **Subtitle**

14 TO ENCOURAGE THE STATE OF ARKANSAS TO  
15 REFRAIN FROM CONTRACTING WITH COMPANIES  
16 OR ENTITIES THAT BENEFIT FROM UYGHUR  
17 FORCED LABOR.

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19 WHEREAS, there is currently a genocide occurring in Xinjiang, China  
20 that is documented through investigations, including credible investigative  
21 journalism outlets, Congressional Findings, formal reports issued by the  
22 United States Department of State, the United States Department of Homeland  
23 Security, and other agencies; and

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25 WHEREAS, outside the internment camps and prisons, the Xinjiang  
26 government is implementing an apartheid-like system of persecution of  
27 ordinary people, including forced sterilization, forced birth control, forced  
28 abortion, forced marriage, forced labor, and other atrocity crimes; and

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30 WHEREAS, these camps target citizens on the basis of their religious  
31 and ethnic identity, especially Uyghurs, Kazakhs, and Kyrgyz, and other  
32 Turkic majority-Muslim peoples; and

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34 WHEREAS, within the camps, detainees are required to memorize Communist  
35 propaganda, repeat the anthems of the Chinese Communist Party (CCP), and are  
36 forbidden from expressing any form of their religion including, but not



1 limited to: praying, abstaining from forbidden foods, owning religious books,  
2 having a beard, or wearing the hijab; and

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4 WHEREAS, Uyghurs under China's 24-7 surveillance systems are unable to  
5 speak publicly without risking immediate detention and international  
6 observers must provide a voice for the voiceless by ensuring by law that  
7 international business operations do not lend support and assistance to the  
8 atrocity crimes detailed above; and

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10 WHEREAS, the United States Department of State, United States  
11 Department of the Treasury, United States Department of Commerce, United  
12 States Department of Labor, and United States Department of Homeland Security  
13 have condemned the Chinese government's repression of Uyghurs, and have  
14 twice, in July 2020 and July 2021, warned American businesses that there is a  
15 "high risk" of complicity, and of violating United States laws, unless they  
16 conduct a detailed analysis of their global supply chains; and

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18 WHEREAS, in February of 2022, the United States led a diplomatic  
19 boycott of the Winter Olympics held in Beijing, China, because of the human  
20 rights abuses of the country; and

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22 WHEREAS, former Under Secretary of State for Economic Growth, Energy,  
23 and the Environment, Keith Krach issued a letter confirming that the People's  
24 Republic of China is committing some of the most serious acts involving mass  
25 human rights abuses since World War II and stated that "corporate  
26 responsibility is social responsibility" and that companies should feel  
27 obligated to dissociate themselves from the atrocities occurring in China;  
28 and

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30 WHEREAS, in June of 2021, the Uyghur genocide was condemned by the  
31 Southern Baptist National Convention; and

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33 WHEREAS, many industries have been documented as linked to forced labor  
34 in the region, many of which have been identified under the Uyghur Forced  
35 Labor Prevention Act as high-risk products, including cotton, tomatoes,  
36 construction materials, automotive inputs, and polysilicon; and

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WHEREAS, this is a cause that many Arkansans support throughout the state, as seen through the widespread support of the youth-led End the Uyghur Genocide project,

NOW THEREFORE,  
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:

THAT the Senate encourage the State of Arkansas to refrain from contracting with companies or entities that benefit from Uyghur forced labor.
