The Arkansas Department of Correction (ADC) is requesting approval of the above referenced technical service contract to Appriss, Inc. This contract provides continuous monitoring of ADC employees, as it relates to their criminal history, or activities that could possibly result in an arrest situation. The Appriss contract also provides this same monitoring of visitors to ADC facilities.

Our agency provides an interface file from our Electronic Offender Management Information System (eOMIS) application to Appriss of all the staff and visitor information. Appriss provides email information on bookings for possible staff and visitors based on the criteria we provide to them. We do not access anything, we interface with them and they return information from a database.

In accordance with OSP "Policy Directive on Sole Source Procurements", the below information is provided:

1. Why is this service or commodity needed?

JusticeXchange was developed by Appriss, a Louisville, Kentucky based provider of products and services for criminal justice and government agencies. The service provides users with the only near real-time access to a national jail database which gives instant access to information about current and former offenders held in county jails and prisons throughout the nation. The JusticeXchange information includes biographical data about the offender, charges, photographs, and behavioral reports. The data provided through the JusticeXchange service is being harvested off of a proprietary data network that has been deployed by Appriss for over 20 years.

In addition to jail management system data, warrants, probation/parole records, and other record types are also available for sharing among agencies. The ability to integrate both jail and record

management data into one Web portal for criminal justice to share is helping agencies around the country. Basic analytics, including link analysis and a mapping tool, are additional tools to help users.

The JusticeExchange service allows law enforcement and other government agencies to locate wanted persons within moments of their being booked into a local jail. This solves a major gap in the criminal justice system. Often it is the case that a wanted person is sitting in a local jail, but the agency searching for the person has no way of knowing they are there. This is a basic problem that plagues the entire criminal justice system. The JusticeExchange service is the only near real-time network of local jail information systems in existence. It covers over 6,000 local jails and 71% of all Departments of Correction beds in America. By using this tool, users can search the "inventory" of offenders that are, or have been, incarcerated in thousands of jails across more than 36 states within just a few seconds. The data is also updated every hour.

America's local jails are the entry point for many criminals as they interact with the Criminal Justice System. The Bureau of Justice Statistics reports that 46 percent of all offenders booked into these local jails are on probation, parole, or are wanted by some other law enforcement agency. Unfortunately, the average time an offender is in custody is less than 24 hours. Without a near real-time data network like JusticeExchange, these offenders are released without an effective way to alert those law enforcement agencies that are looking for them.

2. What method(s) were used to determine that a lack of responsible competition exists for this service or commodity?

Over the past several years, there have been attempts to procure services similar to JusticeExchange. The documented results of these efforts continue to demonstrate that a national, virtually real-time data network is only available today through Appriss. The following details document the attempts to seek competitive procurement and the result of each process.

- **Arkansas-**This was the first state to use the Appriss Data Network for law enforcement and launch JusticeExchange. Their project was funded by the Department of Justice under the COPS Program. The COPS office approved the sole source procurement of JusticeExchange in 2002, 2003, and 2004. Each year the DOJ required further justification of the sole source requirement, and each time, the decision to sole source was approved. Once the Department of Justice approved these sole source procurements, the Arkansas State Purchasing division did its own review and reached the same conclusion that Appriss was the sole provider able to deliver a virtually real-time national network of jail data.

- **Washington-**The Washington Association of Sheriffs and Police Chiefs (WASPC) developed a statewide Jail Booking Repository known as JBRS. The agency used a Department of Justice COPS grant to build the repository, but did not have a solution for collecting data from the jails in Washington. After a national search of options, WASPC sole sourced the procurement to Appriss for integrating the JusticeExchange national jail network into the JBRS program as the data source for their law enforcement users.
- **Utah--**The state of Utah began building a statewide integrated justice portal to gather a wide variety of Utah criminal justice information, so that a law enforcement

agency could perform a single query about a person and see all of the information available in the various criminal justice systems throughout the state. They did not have a way to extract information from the 29 county jails, because they all used stand-alone information systems. In 2004, Utah sole sourced the procurement for this component of their program to Appriss. By integrating JusticeXchange into the Utah integrated justice portal, they were able to get real-time information from all of the Utah jails, as well as thousands of other jails outside of Utah. It was determined by Utah that only Appriss had a network deployed within the state to deliver this local jail data.

- **Kentucky-** The Kentucky Department of Correction has used the VINE program since 1996, and in 2004, they decided to purchase a service, so law enforcement agencies in Kentucky could search for offenders housed in their county jails. Due to state procurement guidelines, the Department was required to do a competitive bid process. The procurement process was widely advertised but resulted in only one other company besides Appriss to respond. The company was a small computer company in Tennessee with no existing data network into Kentucky or any other jails. The second company was disqualified as non-compliant, and the award was made to Appriss.
- **Texas-** The Texas Department of Homeland Security issued a major procurement for a jail information sharing program in May of 2005. This procurement described a system that could share local jail data from 65 percent of the local jails in Texas plus another 800 local jails on a national basis. While many companies looked at this procurement, Appriss and Northup Grumman were the only companies to submit bids on the project. After a review, it was determined that Northup Grumman did not have an existing real-time network of jail data in Texas or outside of the state to offer. Based on this fact, Northup Grumman was judged non-responsive, and Appriss was selected for the project. Due to the size of this project, any vendor capable of providing the information would surely have bid the project.

3. How was it determined that this service provider or commodity has exclusive processes or properties?

The nation's jails are primarily controlled by local sheriffs that are independently elected by their voters. In researching which vendors might be able to widely share local jail information, our organization contacted the National Sheriff's Association. This association represents local sheriffs in all 50 states and is the voice of the sheriffs for national law enforcement issues. In 2005, the Appriss data network was recognized by the National Sheriff's Association (NSA) as a unique data network as the NSA voted to endorse JusticeXchange at its annual summer conference. This endorsement validates the unique and exclusive nature of the JusticeXchange program for helping law enforcement search the Sheriff's local jails.

Appriss' own history of contracting further validates the sole source nature of this service. For more than 20 years, Appriss has acquired hundreds of local, state, and Federal government contracts and more than 90 percent of their contracts have been procured under sole source processes due to the unique nature of their technology and data network.

4 Can requirements be modified so that the services or commodity can be competitively bid? If not, why?

No. There is not another company that performs this type of service or that has the resources already established to provide this service. To alter the specific requirements would prevent the objective of the services from being performed.

5 Are there patent, copyright or proprietary rights which make the required service or commodity unavailable from other sources? Yes, the technology used for Appriss' core solution (VINE) is proprietary to Appriss and is protected under a US Patent. The patent covers 38 different patent claims under US Patent No: 5,961,810. This patent is titled "System and method for providing crime victims updated information and emergency alert notices". It is this patented core technology that is found in the data network that feeds the JusticeExchange program.

6 What would the agency do if the service or commodity were no longer available?


There are currently no other known sources for this service, and if Appriss or JusticeExchange's services were no longer available, it would be a step backward for this agency's criminal justice efforts and potentially be costly to the agency as well.

7 Detail any program considerations which make the use of a "Sole Source" critical to the successful completion of the task(s).

The Appriss data network covers over 6,000 jails and over 53% of all Departments of Correction beds in America. Our research has validated that that there is no other near real-time national network or jail data in existence. This same data network has been judged to be exclusive by the U.S. Department of Justice when it was selected by the Department of Justice, Office of Federal Detention Trustee (OFDT). This agency has contracted with Appriss to use this data network to provide real-time information about available bed space in local jails currently on the network. It is the only near real-time source for local jail information they are using.

2. What method(s) were used to determine that a lack of responsible competition exists for this service or commodity?

These are documentaries created specifically for their intended purposes. There is no other organization that has the rights to license these videos, which include interviews from the original ENIAC programmers who have since passed away. This contract would allow unlimited screenings of the original or edited versions of The Computers, The Coders and the Future Makers at meetings, conferences, sessions, discussions, conferences, seminars, and other presentations in Arkansas by any current employee of the State of Arkansas authorized by the Arkansas Department of Education Commissioner of Education or his/her designee or the Governor of Arkansas or his/her designee provided the films are not streamed, taped, or rebroadcast. It also would provide rights to edit The Computers, The Coders and the Future Makers into new materials created for the Department of Education and State of Arkansas. It will also provide us with a perpetual license for ADE to place all four videos and our created materials on our ArkansasIDEAS LMS (or similar system) so that teachers can access and watch them, share them with students, and allow schools to screen in large group assemblies.


