




















The Hot Springs World Class High School, located at 821 Emory, is a 10th - 12th grade campus. The mission of the HSWCHS is to empower all students to learn at high levels to graduate prepared for success in a global society.

The HSWCHS offers complete career pathways in three career academies with intentional areas of study. The academies include Liberal Studies (International Baccalaureate Programme), Business and Industrial Technologies, and Education and Healthcare. Within these three academies are more than 20 unique pathways from which students choose coursework relevant to a future career.

In 2025, 248 students graduated from HSWCHS, with 83% earning a value-added diploma. The graduating class included 201 Career and Technical Education (CTE) completers, 126 Arts completers, and 17 International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma candidates.

2024 - 2025 ACHIEVEMENTS

- A brand-new high school opened on July 24, 2025, the first day of the 2025-2026 school year.
- Demolition on the old high school, which had opened in 1968, began on June 23, 2025, and Phase II of the project officially began. This includes soccer fields, tennis courts, and a tornado safe room.
- The Hot Springs Dance Troupe traveled to Europe in June 2025 to perform as part of the Stars of Tomorrow International Tour. They performed seven shows and visited eight cities.
- A total of 248 students graduated from the Hot Springs World Class High School on May 8.
- Coach Larry McDaniel was selected as Coach of the Year for the Arkansas Special Olympics.
- Officer Graves was named as the Hot Springs School District Police Department Employee of the Year.
- Heidi Faught-Strong was named Hot Springs School District Teacher of the Year. She was among the 15 finalists for the Arkansas Teacher of the Year.
- Eighteen students received the Seal of Biliteracy.
- HSWCHS was recognized for the second year in a row by the Office of Education Policy at the University of Arkansas for Beating the Odds Overall and in ELA.
- Seven HSSD Destination Imagination teams earned a spot at the Global Finals held in Kansas City, MO, in May. Teams represent HSWCHS, HSJA, LELA, OSTEM, and MVPA.
- HSWCHS Choir earned a Superior I State Qualifier award at the Region 3 Choral Performance Assessment.
- Demetri Burdick, a 7th-grade student at HSJA, won the Garland County Spelling Bee on February 27. Caleb McCann (8th grade, HSJA) and Antwon Luker (5th grade, MVPA) tied for third/fourth place.
- The HSSD GT program was honored with an Office of Education Policy Best Growth Scores in 2024 award. These GT students showed the most growth compared to other programs with the same number of students across the state.
- Six HSWCHS students made the All-Region Band, with three qualifying for All-State: Amelia Wesley, Flute 1st band 6th chair; Marshall Ware, Trumpet 1st band 11th chair; and Braden Fehnel, Trumpet 1st band 12th chair.
- The 9th-grade Trojans and Lady Trojans won the 5A South Conference Championships in basketball.
- Angela Millard, OSTEM Counselor, was named the ARSCA Southwest Elementary Counselor of the Year.
- The HSSD received official notification from DESE that it has been released from Coordinated Literacy Support in January 2025.
- The Trojan Varsity Football Team received the Award of Excellence for an Ejection-Free Season for Football 2024.
- The 9th-grade Boys Basketball Team WON the 4th Annual Hot Springs Basketball Tournament.
- Two HSWCHS students matched with Questbridge. Zaria Grant plans to attend Columbia University, and Tyrell George plans to attend the University of Colorado.
- Beta Students from all six of our schools attended the Beta Leadership Summit in October 2024 and had students qualify to compete at the National Beta Convention in Orlando, Florida in June 2025.
- The Junior High football team earned the 5A conference championship. In addition, the 6th-grade Trojans won the Pee Wee Conference Championship and played in a Super Bowl. The 5th-grade Trojans won their Pee Wee Conference Championship and lost in the JV Pee Wee Super Bowl.
- HSWCHS Teacher Chad Hall and Langston Teacher Bethany Rice received \$500 checks through Arvest Bank's seventh annual "We Love Teachers" campaign.
- HSWCHS senior Tyrell George was named one of 50 "Distinguished Computer Science Students" in Arkansas.
- The HSSD Police Department launched the Men of Troy, a volunteer opportunity to mentor students in the HSSD. They held their first meeting on August 13, 2024.
