

RH The Restore Hope Model:

Restore Hope is an Arkansas nonprofit whose mission is to reduce incarceration and the need for foster care through a community-driven approach. Restore Hope connects courts, state agencies, nonprofits, churches, and community partners to leverage existing resources, reduce silos, coordinate services, and use real-time data to measure outcomes and drive systemic improvement.

The Restore Hope Model provides the foundation for Smart Justice Services and the 10:33 Reentry Program.

- 1 An individual is referred through a court or agency.
- 2 Needs are assessed across thirteen care areas to identify barriers.
- 3 A coordinated care team is assembled to address identified needs
- 4 Communication, services, and progress are coordinated and tracked in HopeHub
- 5 The individual progresses from crisis to stability to thriving

Collective Impact

A structured approach that brings organizations together around a common goal, shared outcomes, coordinated action, and continuous communication. No single organization can address every barrier—but a connected network working toward the same outcomes can move individuals and families from crisis to stability.

Alliance

A county-level coalition of courts, churches, nonprofits, state agencies, and community partners working together to strengthen families and communities. Alliances are local by design—the people at the table know their county, its resources, and the individuals they serve.

HopeHub

A collaborative case-management platform that connects partners through one shared record, assessment, and care plan. HopeHub provides real-time visibility into participant progress, giving courts and partners measurable data on stability and outcomes.

Care Areas

Every participant is assessed across 13 areas of care reflecting key social determinants of health that influence stability and justice involvement. The same areas are measured across initiatives, providing consistent and comparable outcomes across participants, courts, counties, and cohorts.

Smart Justice Services

Navigators are embedded directly in Arkansas district courts, creating an opportunity for early intervention at the front door of the justice system. Justice partners can connect eligible individuals to a Navigator who develops an individualized plan addressing barriers across care areas. Navigators coordinate local services, monitor progress, and report outcomes back to the court—combining accountability with a structured path toward long-term stability.

Eligibility Criteria: Adult (18+), Referred By Judicial Partners, Voluntarily Agree To Participate

\$7,300 + annually

Average monthly income increased from \$1,099 at intake to \$1,714 at the most recent assessment – an increase of \$615 per month, or approximately \$7,380 in additional annual income per participant on average.

Why District Court?

District courts serve as an upstream point of intervention, creating an opportunity to address underlying barriers early—before repeated court involvement leads to deeper involvement in the justice system or incarceration.

At A Glance:

- Judicially Driven - Voluntary participation; courts retain authority.
- Root-Cause Focused - Address underlying conditions and barriers driving justice involvement.
- Data Accountable - Real-time progress visible through HopeHub.

10:33 Reentry Program

The 10:33 Reentry Program begins preparing individuals for successful reentry before release from prison, creating a coordinated transition from incarceration to the community. Participants receive workforce and educational preparation while barriers such as employment, housing, identification, driver's licenses, healthcare, recovery, and legal obligations are addressed. Support continues after release through coordinated services and case management—creating a structured path toward employment, stability, and long-term success.

Eligibility Criteria: Referred by DOC; High School Diploma/GED; Voluntarily Agree To Participate

73.7%

of Cohort 2 participants remained violation-free during the first three months following release, compared with 50.0% of Cohort 1 participants.

Why Reentry?

Reentry is a critical point of intervention, creating an opportunity to address barriers before release and provide a coordinated transition to employment, stability, and community success—reducing the conditions that can lead to violations and repeated justice involvement.

- Pre-Release Support – Barriers addressed before release.
