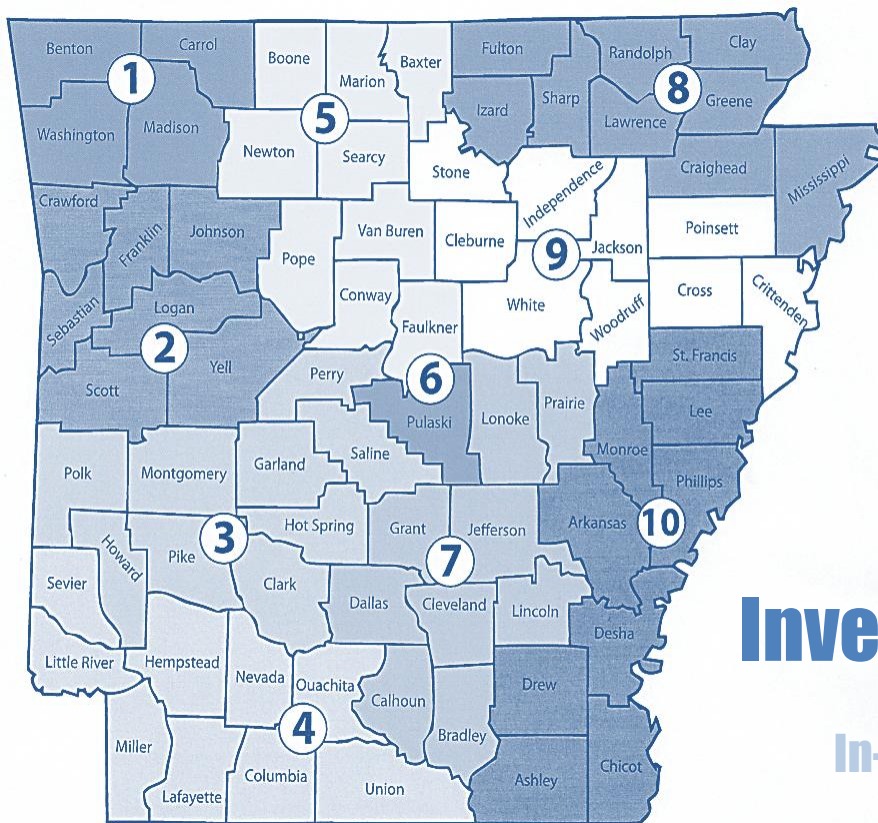

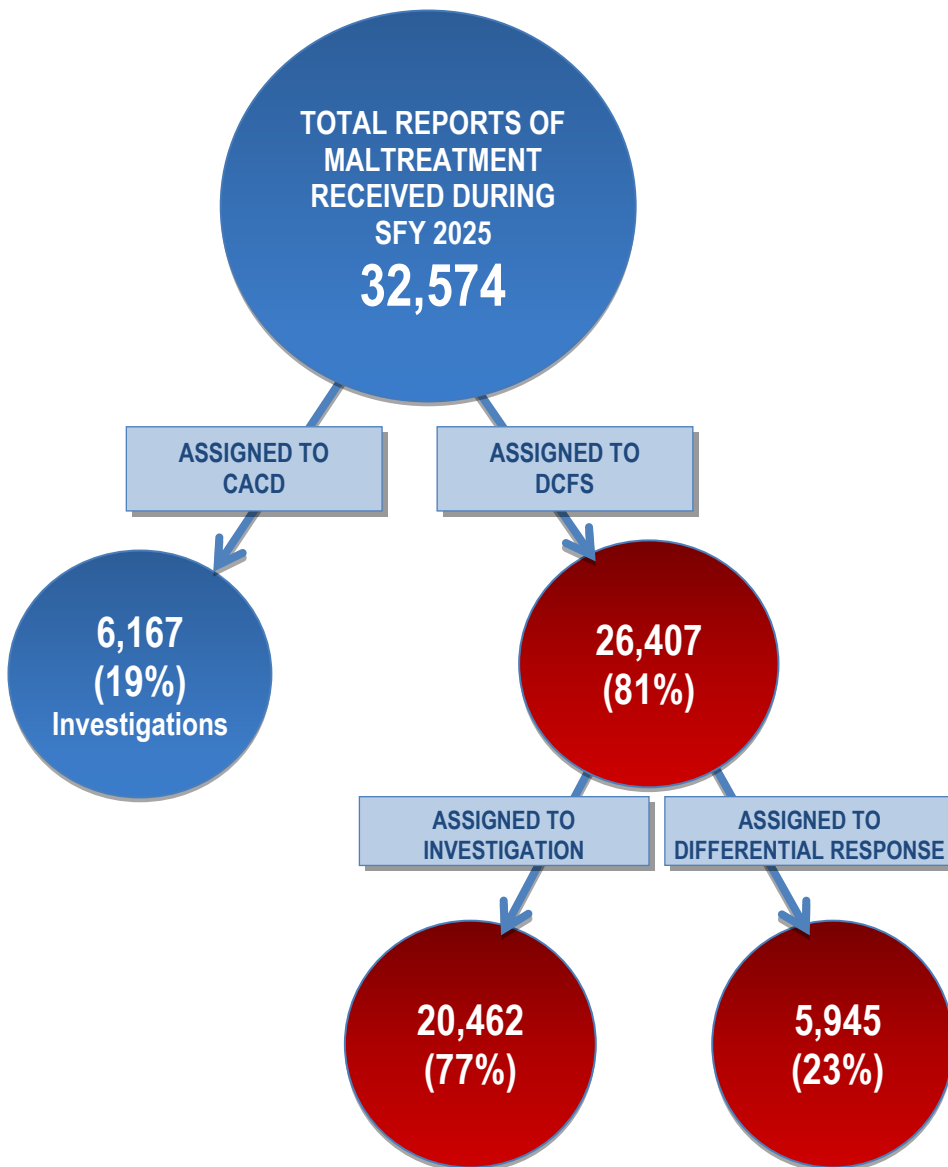
# Reports of Child Maltreatment

## Quick Facts

### Volume and Description of Child Maltreatment Reports

#### Volume of Incoming Reports

Maltreatment Reports Received During  
SFY 2025



Of the 32,574 reports of child maltreatment accepted by the Arkansas Child Abuse Hotline during State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2025, 81 percent were assigned to DCFS and 19 percent were assigned to the Crimes Against Children Division (CACD) of the Arkansas State Police, which is responsible for investigating the most serious allegations of maltreatment.

Of the reports assigned to DCFS, 77 percent were assigned for an investigation and 23 percent were handled through Differential Response (DR).

DR allows the Division to respond to specific, low-risk maltreatment reports through a family assessment and provision of services rather than a traditional investigation.

The following types of allegations can qualify for DR:

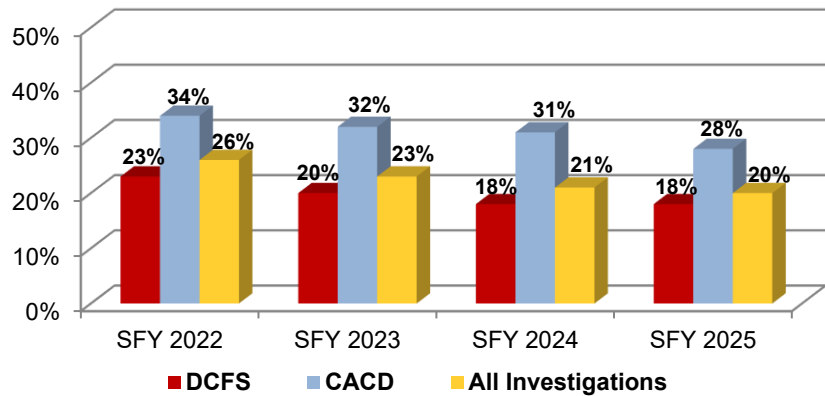
- Inadequate Supervision if children are at least five
- Environmental Neglect if children are at least three
- Medical Neglect if children are at least thirteen
- Lock Out if children are at least ten
- Inadequate Food, Inadequate Shelter, Inadequate Clothing, and Educational Neglect with no age restrictions
- Certain allegations of abuse where the incident occurred at least one year prior to the report date

# Quick Facts

## Findings of Child Maltreatment Investigations

Eighteen percent of the investigations assigned to DCFS during SFY 2025 were found true, compared to 28 percent for CACD. The overall substantiation rate stood at 20 percent.

Percentage Of Investigations Found True



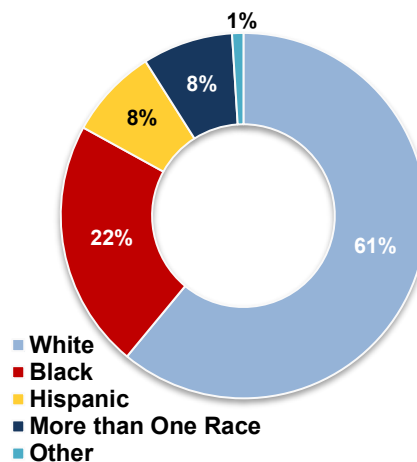
## Characteristics of Children Involved in True Investigations

There were 6,922 victim children involved in the maltreatment investigations that were found true.

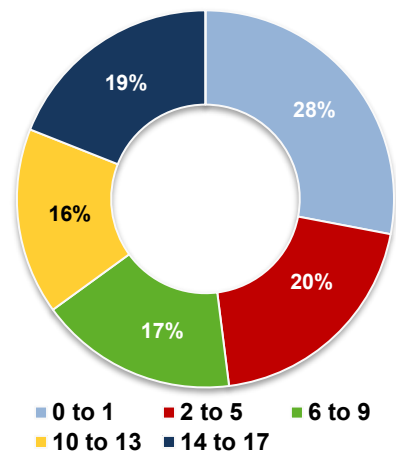
Of those children, 61 percent were white, 22 percent were black, 8 percent were Hispanic, and 8 percent were multiracial. Children ages five and younger accounted for nearly half (48 percent) of the victim children.

A majority of the victim children during SFY 2025 (54 percent) were female.

## Types of Allegations in True Investigations

The majority of the 6,922 victim children in true investigations were involved in allegations of neglect (64 percent), followed by physical abuse (23 percent) and sexual abuse (20 percent).

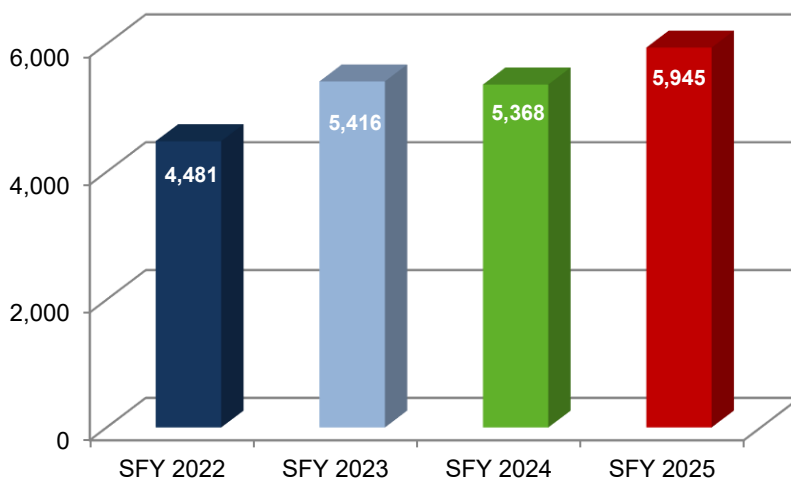

During SFY 2025, there were 38 maltreatment investigations involving a child fatality. While several investigations were still pending, a majority of those in which a disposition had been rendered were found true. There were 25 investigations of near child fatalities during the year; most of those were found true as well.

The number of reports assigned to DR during SFY 2025 (5,945) increased 11 percent over the number assigned during the previous year (5,368).

### Timeliness of Initiating Investigations

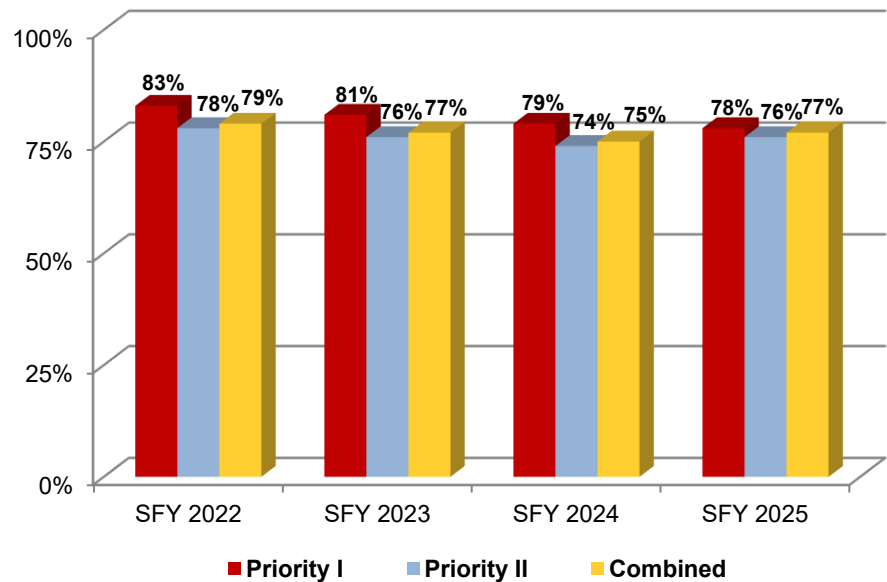
The law requires reports of maltreatment to be initiated within 24 hours of a Priority I report or within 72 hours of a Priority II report.

Priority I reports cite more severe allegations while Priority II reports cite comparatively less serious allegations.

Initiation occurs when all victim children are interviewed or observed (if too young for an interview) within the designated timeframes.

DCFS initiated 77 percent of its investigations on time during SFY 2025, performing slightly better on its Priority I investigations than Priority II.

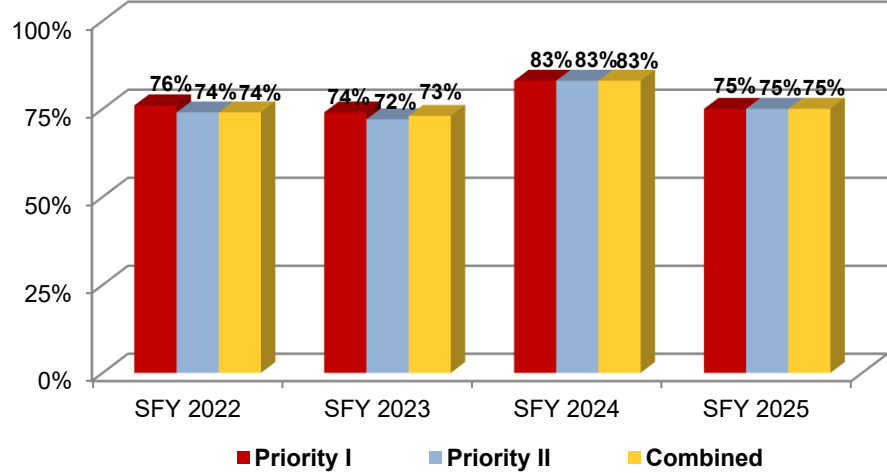
Timely Initiation of Child Maltreatment Assessments (DCFS Only)



### Timeliness of Completing Investigations

DCFS completed 75 percent of its investigations on time (within 45 days of receipt of the report) during SFY 2025, lower than the timely completion rate observed for the previous year.

Timely Completion of Child Maltreatment Assessments (DCFS Only)

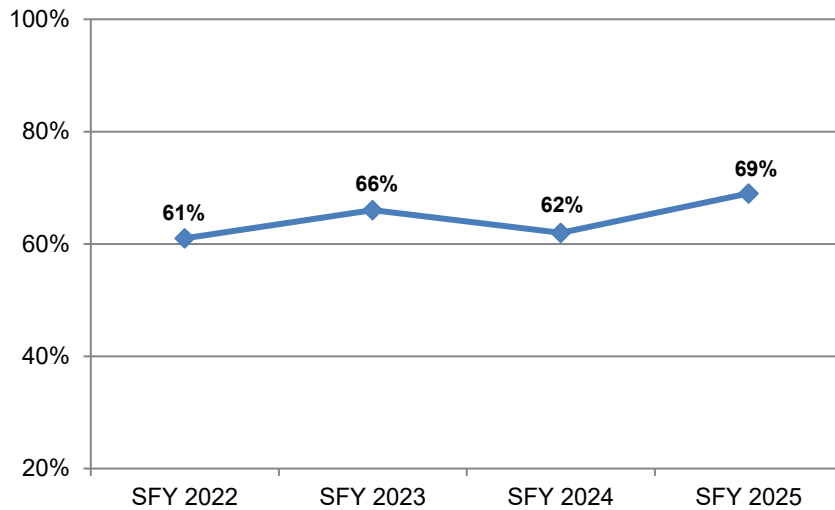

Timely Initiation of DR Reports

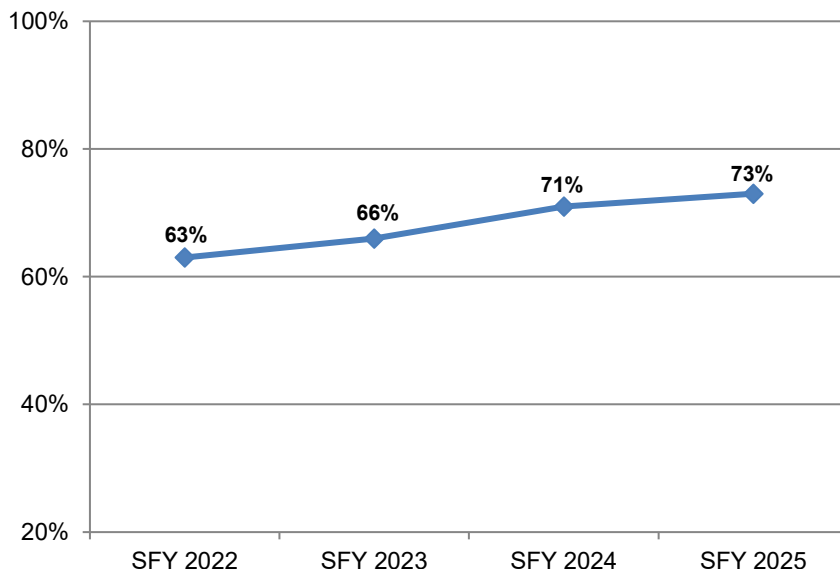


DR referrals must be initiated within 72 hours of receipt of the report.

DCFS initiated 69 percent of its DR reports on time during SFY 2025, an improvement over its performance during the previous year (62 percent).

## Timeliness of Completing Reports Assigned to DR

Timely Closure of DR Reports



Reports assigned to DR are to close within 30 days of receipt of the report. In certain instances when the families' needs necessitate longer involvement, two 15-day extensions can be granted, for a total of 60 days.

The agency closed 73 percent of its DR reports on time during SFY 2025, taking into account reports in which extensions were granted.

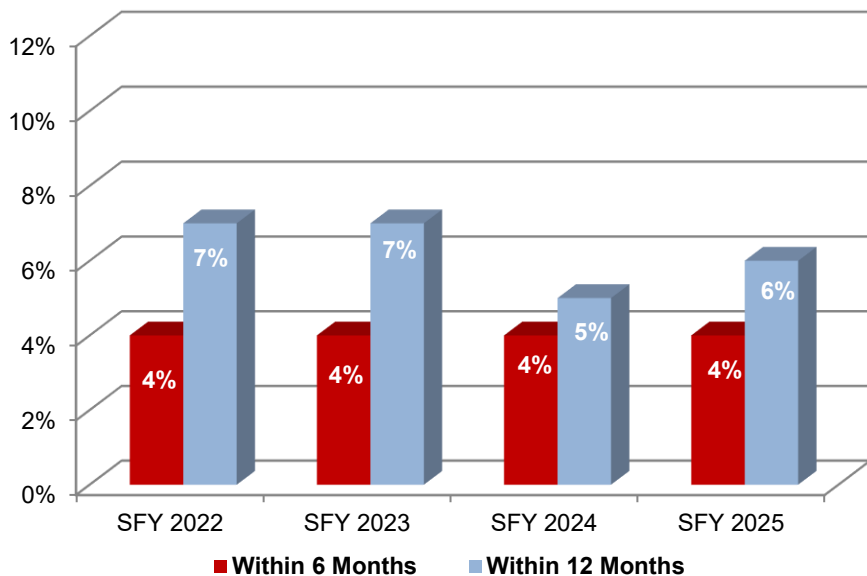

## Benefits to Children and Families

### Preventing the Recurrence of Maltreatment

Four percent of the victim children involved in true investigations during the previous year experienced a recurrence of maltreatment within six months. Six percent experienced a recurrence of maltreatment within 12 months.

Recurrence of Maltreatment within 6 and 12 Months

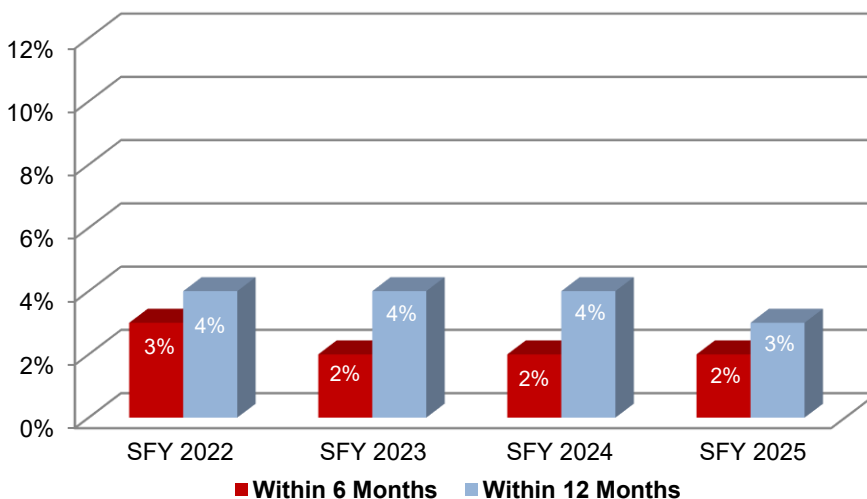


The National Standard for recurrence within 12 months is 9.1 percent or less

Three percent of the children who began receiving DR services were involved in a true investigation of child maltreatment within six months, and two percent were involved in a true investigation within 12 months.

# In-Home Services

## Quick Facts

### Volume and Description of Cases

#### Volume of Cases

In most instances DCFS offers in-home services through a protective services case, which is opened when a true maltreatment report or court order necessitates DCFS' involvement with a family but there is not an immediate threat to any child's safety in the home.

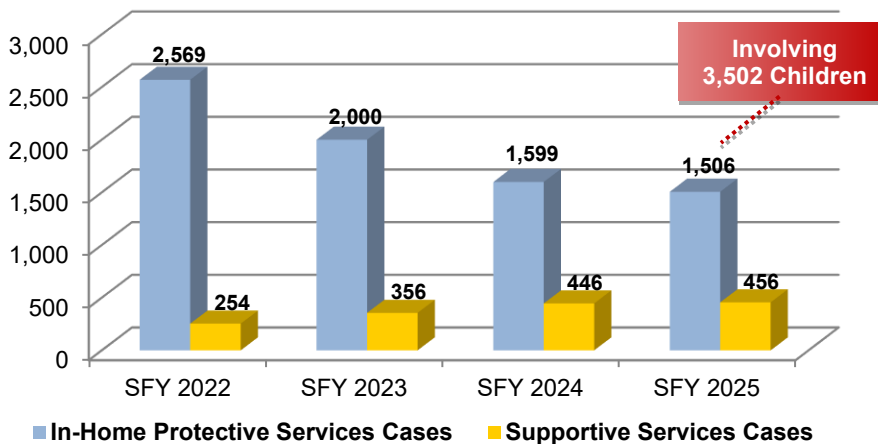
The number of in-home protective services cases open at the end of SFY 2025 decreased by six percent compared to one year ago. At the end of the year, there were 1,506 in-home protective services cases open across the state, involving 3,502 children.

The Division also offers in-home supportive services to families on a voluntary basis. DCFS was responsible for 456 supportive services cases at the end of the year.

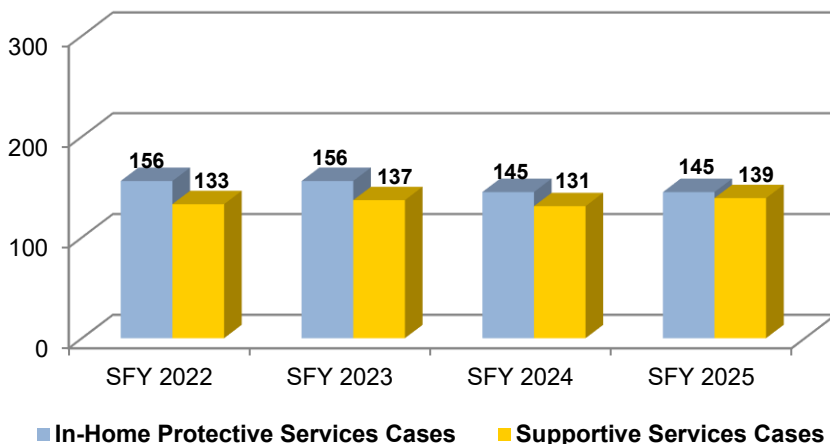
#### Length of Time Cases Have Been Open

Both in-home protective services cases and supportive services cases that were active as of the end of SFY 2025 had been open, on average, for just over four and one-half months.

Average Number of Days In-Home Cases Have Been Open

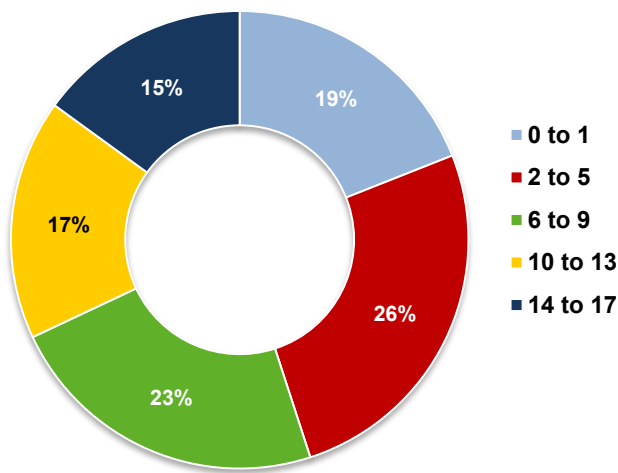

Age of Children in In-Home Cases



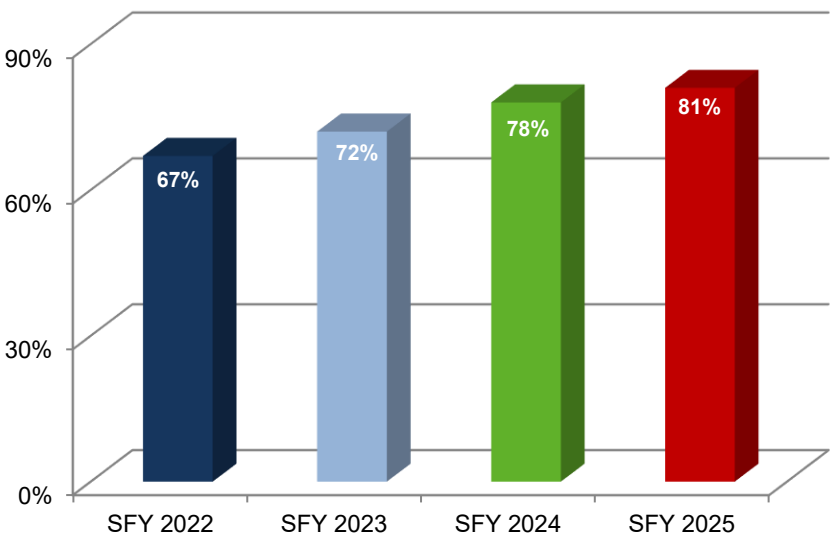

## Monthly Visits to In-Home Protective Services Cases

Families with an open in-home protective services case must receive a face-to-face visit from a caseworker each month. Caseworkers made 81 percent of these required visits during SFY 2025.

The in-home visitation rate has steadily improved in recent years. The Division’s goal is 85 percent.

Required Monthly Visits to In-Home Cases

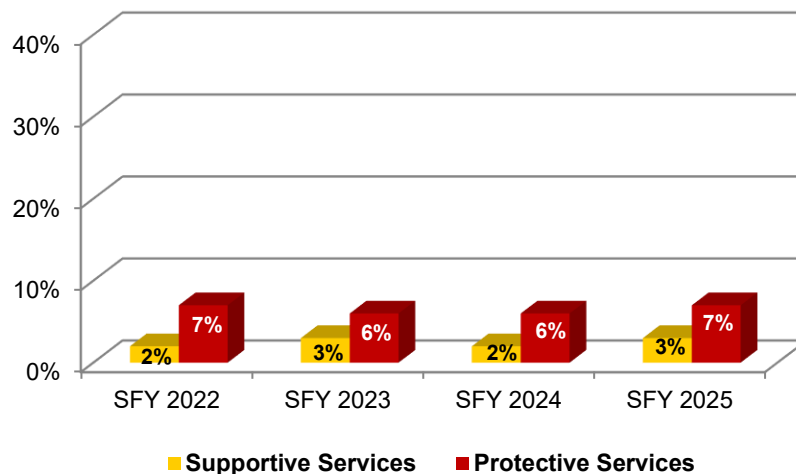

### Victimization Rate Among Children Who Received Protective and Supportive Services

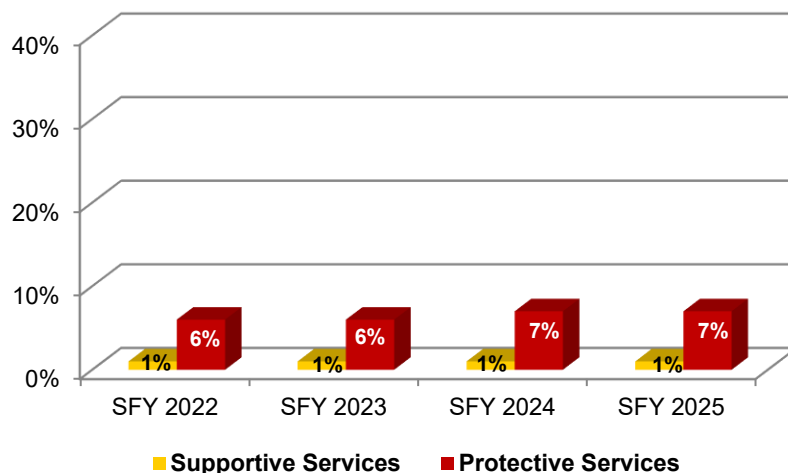
**Percentage of Children Receiving Supportive and Protective Services who were Abused or Neglected within One Year of the Initiation of Service**



Of the children who began receiving in-home protective services during the year prior to SFY 2025, seven percent experienced a true report of maltreatment within one year. Of the children who began receiving supportive services during the year prior to SFY 2025, three percent were involved in a true report within one year.

### Rate of Entry Into Foster Care Among Children Who Received Protective and Supportive Services

**Percentage of Children Receiving Supportive or Protective Services who Entered Foster Care within One Year of the Initiation of Service**



Of the children who began receiving protective services one year prior to SFY 2025, seven percent entered foster care within one year of the initiation of those services. Meanwhile, one percent of the children who began receiving supportive services during the same timeframe entered care within one year.

Overall, in-home services prevent the vast majority of the children from being re-victimized or entering foster care within one year of initiation.

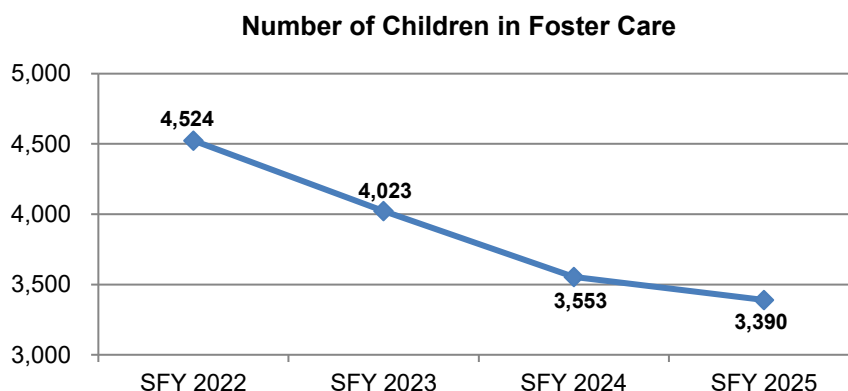

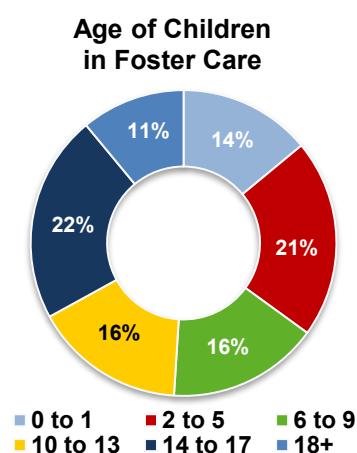
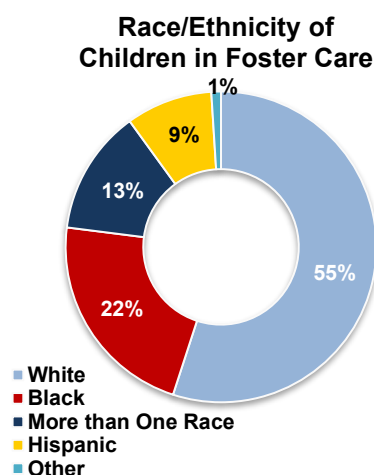
There were 3,390 children in foster care at the end of SFY 2025. This represented a decrease of five percent from SFY 2024 (3,553).



#### Characteristics of Children in Foster Care

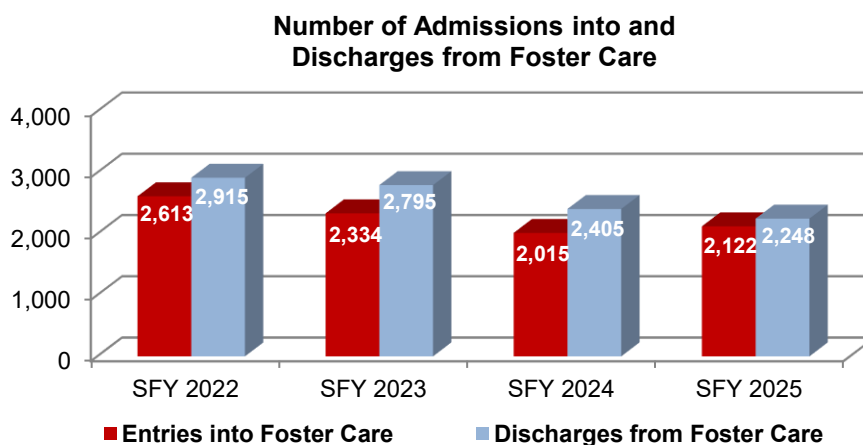
At the end of SFY 2025, children ages five years or younger made up 35 percent of all children in foster care. Fifty-five percent of those in care were white, 22 percent were black, and 13 percent were multiracial.

Of the children in foster care at the end of the quarter, 51 percent were male and 49 percent were female.

Neglect and substance abuse were the most prevalent reasons for children entering foster care during the year.

Arkansas' Safe Haven Law allows for anonymous and legal relinquishment of infants up to 30 days old in designated locations (e.g., hospitals, police and fire stations, Safe Haven baby boxes), with the infants then entering foster care so DCFS can work to find them a permanent home. No children entered foster care via the Safe Haven Law during the year.

*National data<sup>2</sup> indicate that the three most prevalent reasons children leave care are reunification (44%), adoption (27%), and guardianship (10%).*

Forty-two percent of the children who left foster care during SFY 2025 were reunified with their own family, 24 percent were adopted, and 10 percent each were discharged to relative custody and guardianship.

Overall, 91 percent of the children exiting care in Arkansas achieved permanency either by returning home or via discharge to relatives, an adoptive home, or another permanent arrangement.

## Length of Stay in Foster Care

Of the children in foster care at the end of SFY 2025, just over half (53 percent) had been in care for 12 months or longer.

## Placements of Children in Foster Care

Overall, 77 percent of the children in foster care at the end of SFY 2025 resided in a family-like setting (i.e., relative placement, foster family home, therapeutic foster home, trial home visit, pre-adoptive home).

Six percent resided in congregate care, which represents placement in a qualified residential treatment program (QRTP), residential treatment care or residential care only program, or emergency shelter.

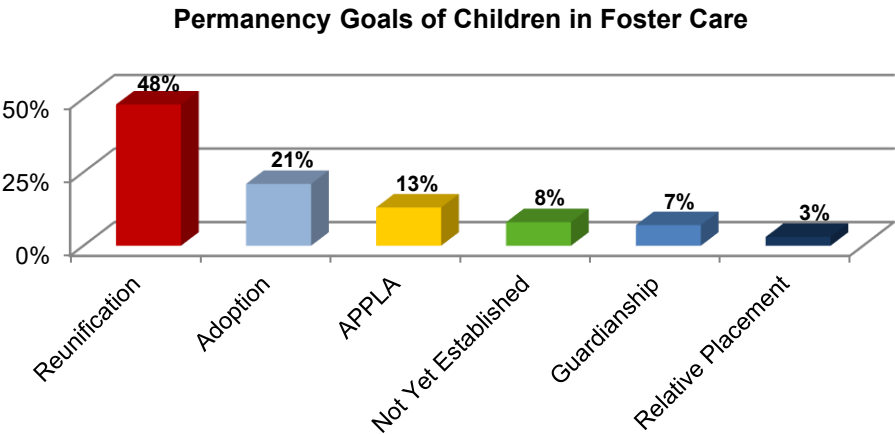
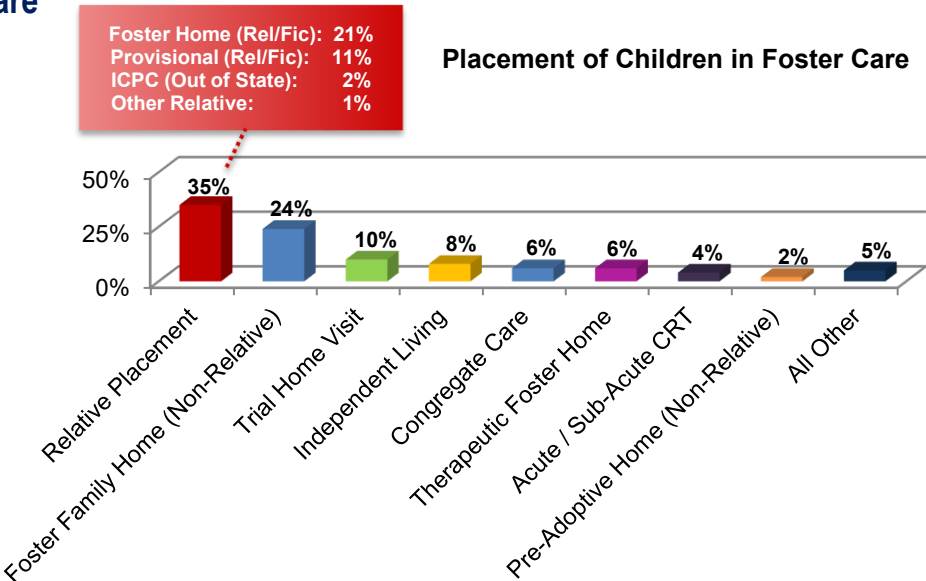
## Permanency Goals of Children in Foster Care

Forty-eight percent of the children in care at the end of SFY 2025 had a permanency goal of reunification (return home) and 21 percent had a goal of adoption.

These figures differ slightly from national data from the Children’s Bureau as of May 2025, with averages of 42 percent for reunification and 23 percent for adoption.

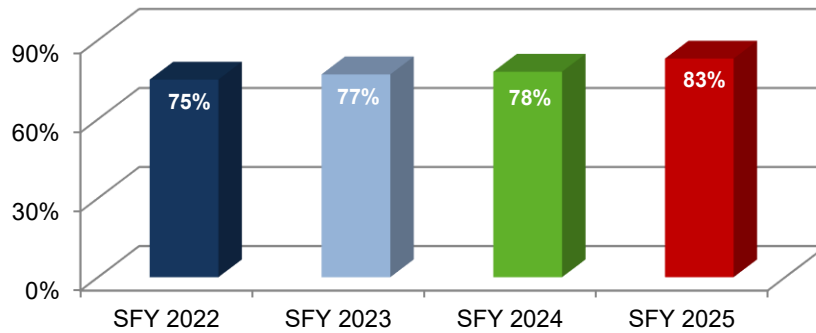




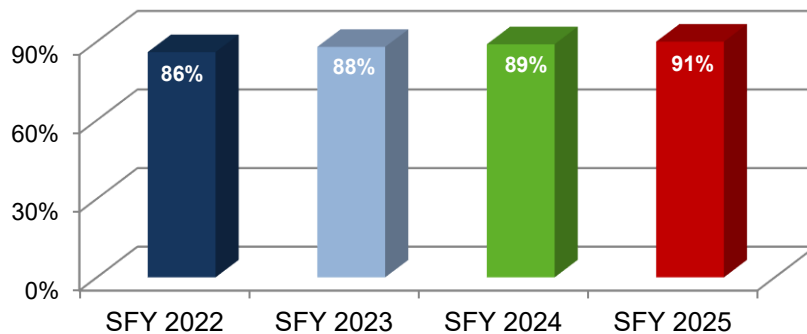

**Children in Care who Received Monthly Face-to-Face Visits by Any DCFS Staff**



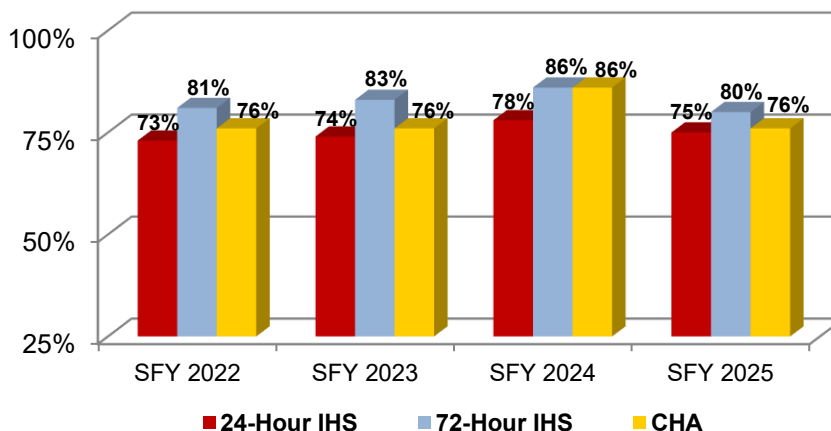
To ensure safety and well-being, best practice requires children in foster care to be visited in their placements by their caseworkers each month. The Division's goal is to make 95 percent of these visits.

DCFS caseworkers made 83 percent of their required monthly face-to-face visits with children in care statewide during SFY 2025.

On average, 91 percent of the children received a face-to-face monthly contact from *any* DCFS staff member—regardless of the staff member's position, location of the visit, or the purpose—during the year.

## Initial Health Screenings and Comprehensive Health Assessments

**24-hour and 72-Hour Initial Health Screening and Comprehensive Health Assessments**



Depending on the severity of alleged maltreatment that leads to a child's entry into care, DCFS must complete either a 24-hour initial health screening (IHS) or 72-hour IHS. Children must also receive a Comprehensive Health Assessment (CHA) within 60 days of entering care.

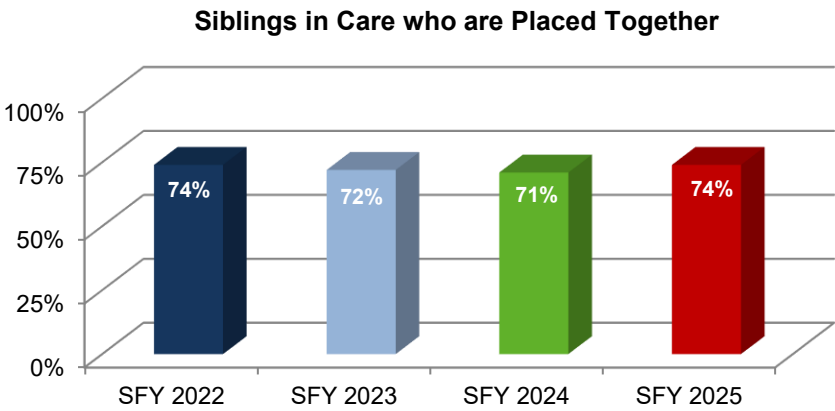
DCFS completed 75 percent of its required 24-hour IHSs, 80 percent of its 72-hour IHSs, and 76 percent of its CHAs on time during SFY 2025.

## Siblings in Placement Who Are Placed Together

At the end of SFY 2025, 74 percent of the children with siblings in foster care were placed with at least one of their siblings, while 55 percent were placed with all of their siblings.

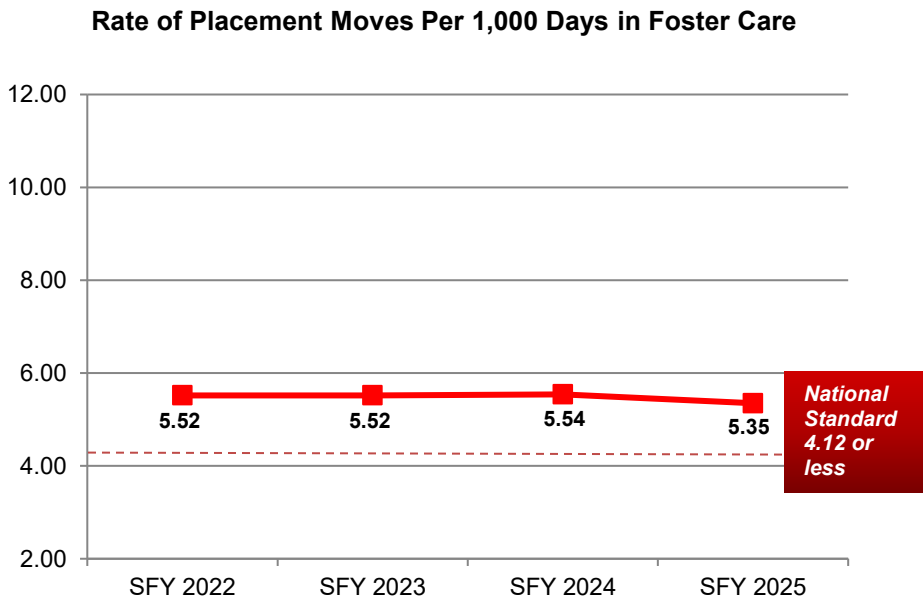
These figures do not exclude children who were placed separately for valid reasons such as safety issues or court orders.



## Placement Stability of Children in Foster Care

Placement stability is measured by the rate of placement moves per 1,000 days in foster care for children who enter care over a 12-month period.

For SFY 2025, the placement stability rate was 5.35, an improvement over the previous year. The national standard is a rate of 4.12.

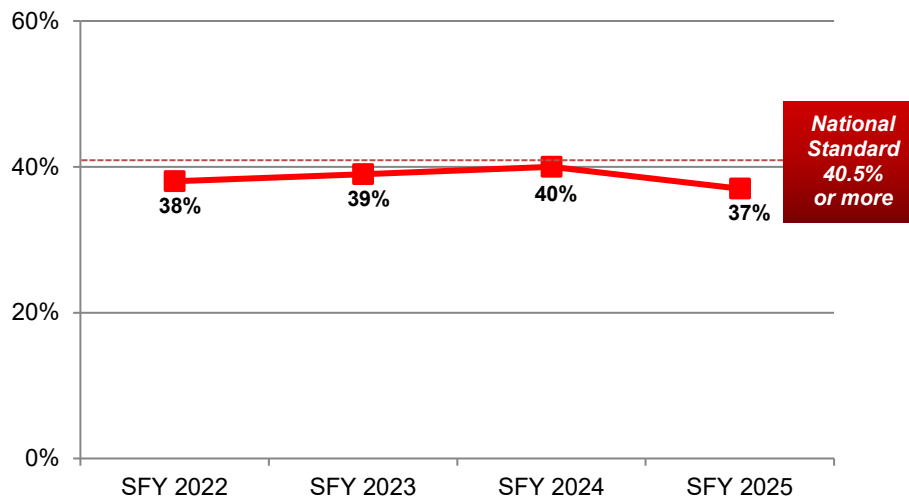
## Benefits to Children and Families

### Achieving Permanency

The national standard is for 40.5 percent of all children entering foster care to achieve permanency (i.e., exiting foster care to a permanent living situation) within 12 months of removal. Discharges from foster care due to reunification, relative custody, non-custodial parent custody, guardianship, adoption, and non-relative custody are considered to be permanent living situations.

For SFY 2025, 37 percent of the children entering care in Arkansas achieved permanency within 12 months.

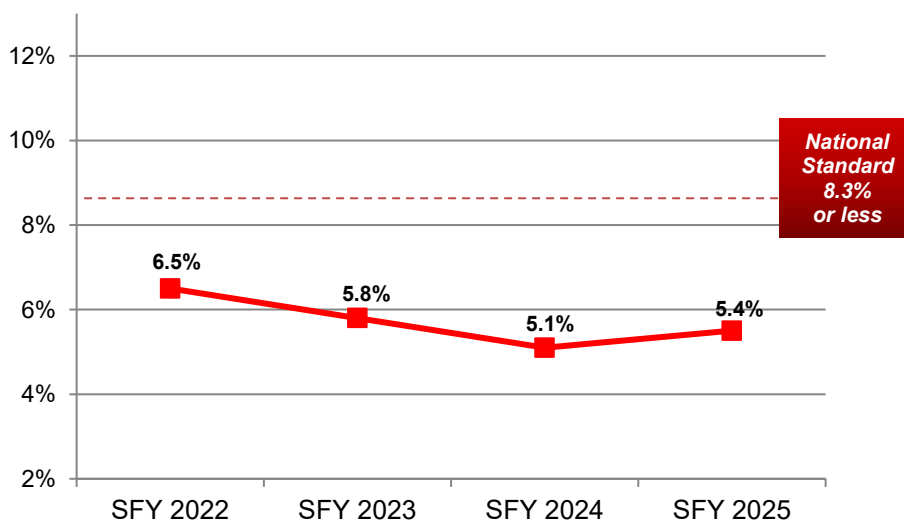
Permanency within 12 Months of Entering Foster Care



### Preventing Children's Re-Entry Into Foster Care

For SFY 2025, just over five percent of the children who were discharged to their families re-entered foster care within 12 months. The Division consistently meets the national standard of 8.3 percent or less.

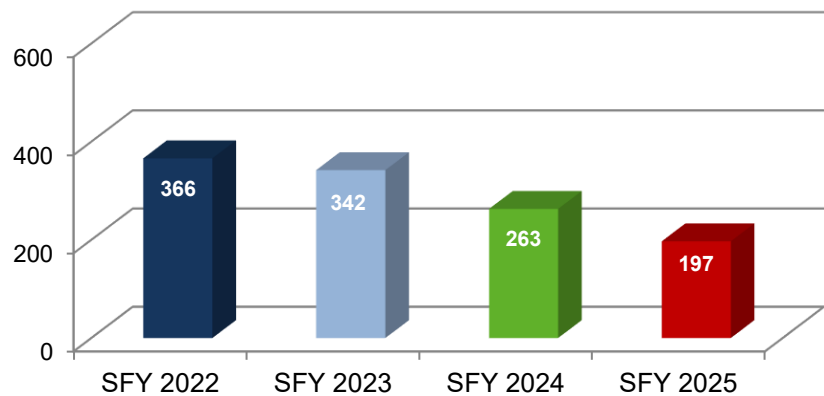
### Volume and Description of Cases

DCFS estimates that it has identified a possible pre-adoptive placement for approximately 20 percent of the children available for adoption.

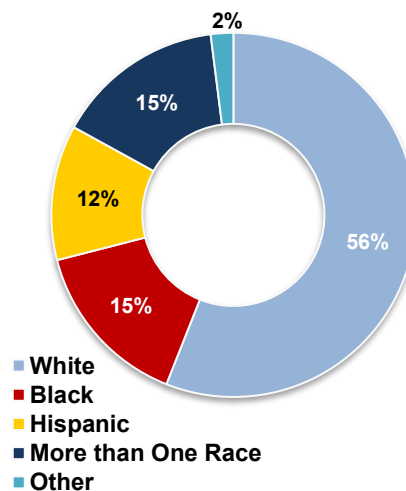
Number of Children Available for Adoption



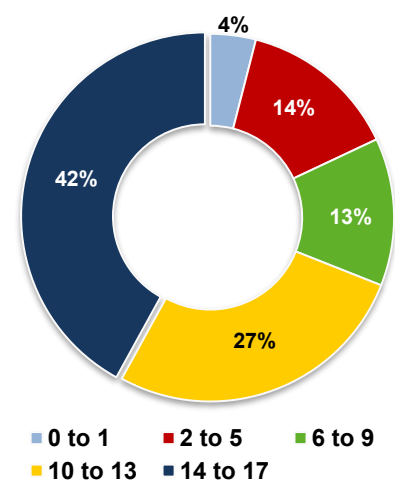
### Characteristics of Children Available for Adoption

Race/Ethnicity of Children Available for Adoption



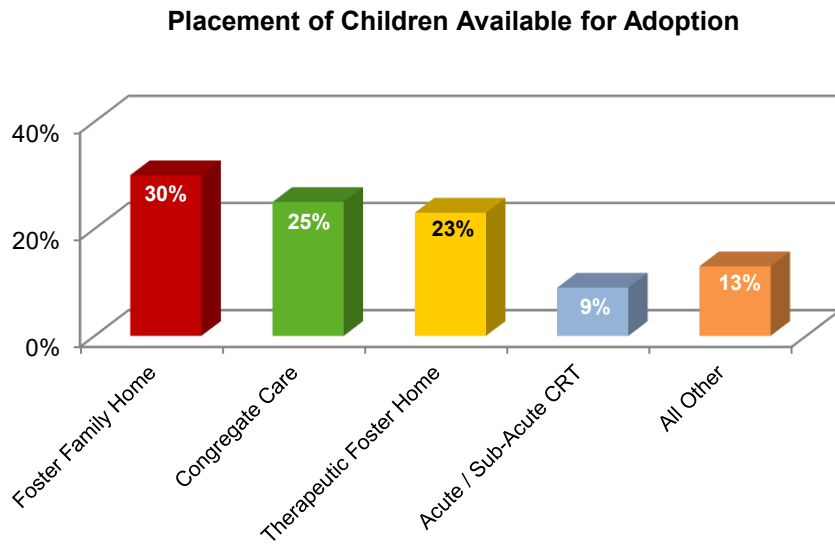
Age of Children Available for Adoption

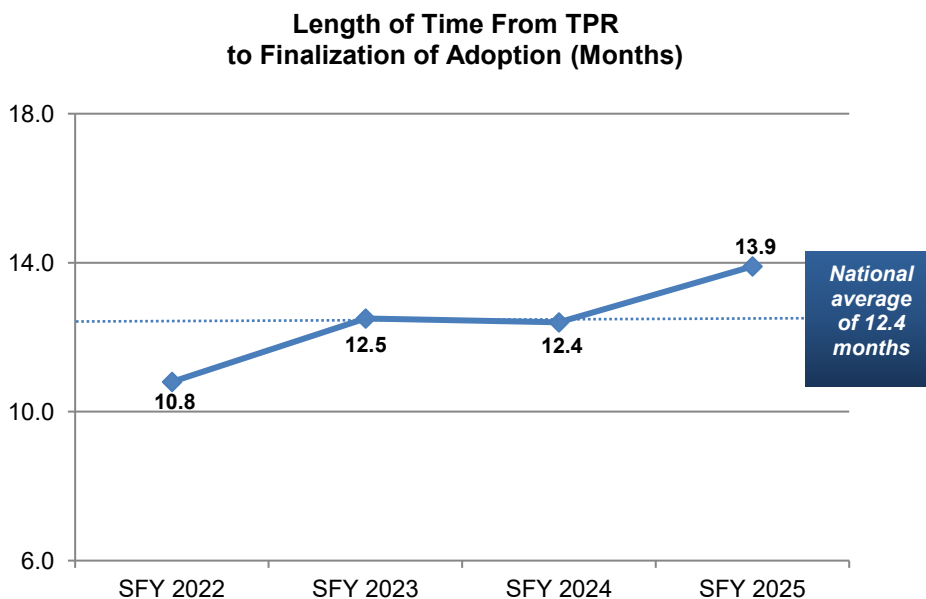
## Placement of Children Available for Adoption

Arkansas' average length of time from termination of parental rights (TPR) until adoption finalization was nearly 14 months during SFY 2025, over two months longer than the average observed for the previous year.

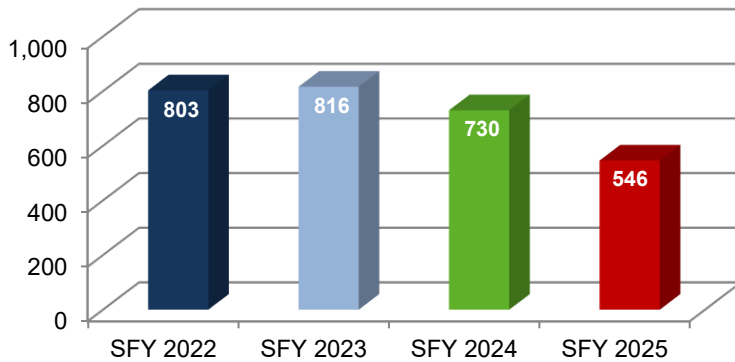

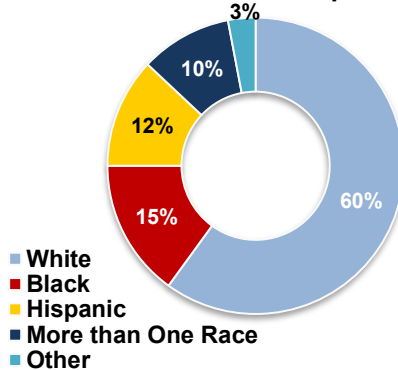
### Finalized Adoptions

Five-hundred and forty-six adoptions were finalized during SFY 2025.

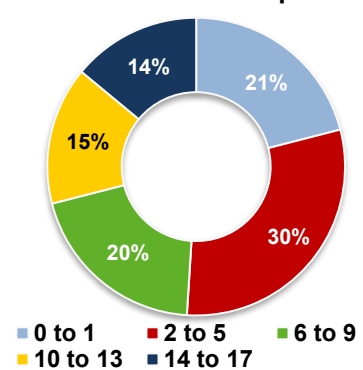
Thirty-six percent of the adoptions finalized during the year were by relatives.

Children ages zero to five made just over half (51 percent) of children who were adopted during SFY 2025. White children made 60 percent of those adopted.

### Subsidized Adoptions

Subsidies are given to children with special needs, defined as:

- Caucasian and over nine
- African-American and at least two
- At least two members of a sibling group
- Children who have severe medical or psychological needs that require ongoing treatment
- Children at high risk for the development of serious physical, mental, or emotional conditions documented by a medical professional.

During SFY 2025, **688** children began receiving adoption subsidies. Of those, 658 were federally-funded and 30 were state funded subsidies.

During SFY 2025, a total of **8,842** children received adoption subsidies.

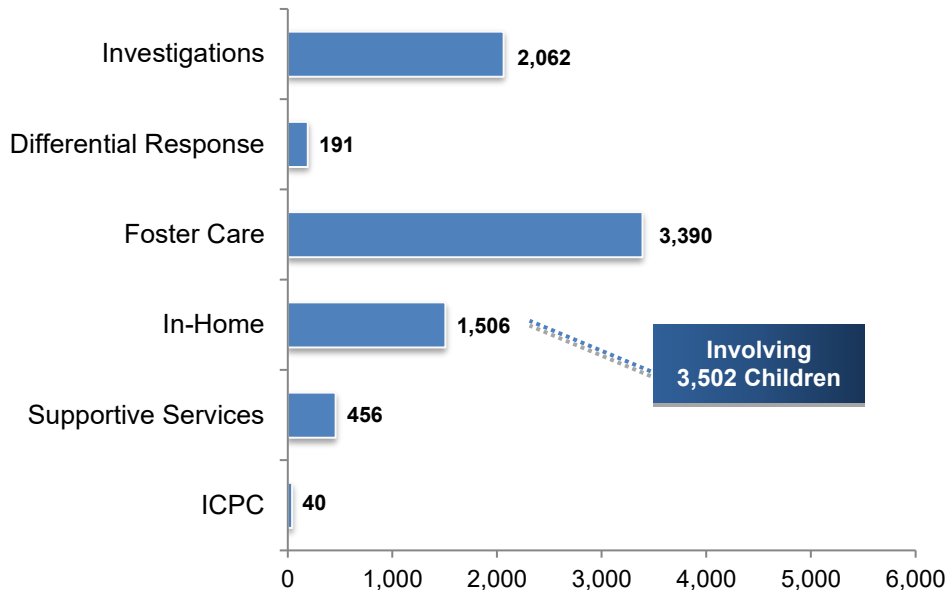
#### Caseloads at the End of SFY 2025

As of the end of SFY 2025, the Division was responsible for:

- 2,062 investigations of child maltreatment and 191 DR cases;
- 3,390 foster care cases (3,237 excluding adoption cases);
- 1,506 in-home cases, involving 3,502 children;
- 456 supportive services cases and 40 interstate compact for the placement of children (ICPC) cases.

This is while the Division was staffed with 438 family service workers, who were responsible for handling these cases.

Types of Cases at the End of SFY 2025



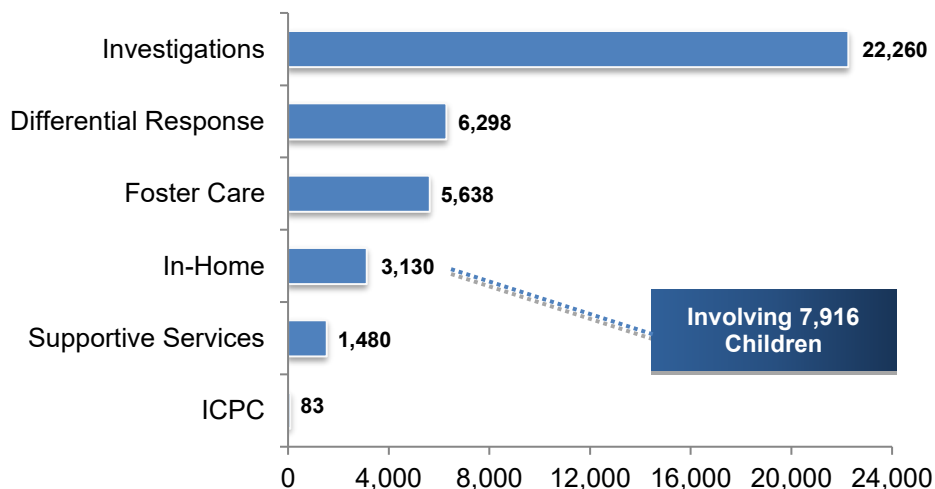
*One foster care case is equal to one child in care; one in-home or supportive services case constitutes an entire family, many of which have multiple children.*

#### Caseloads Handled *During* the Year

This chart shows the number of cases that cycled through the system during SFY 2025, i.e., the number of families or children served during the year (as opposed to those active at the end of the year, described above).

The Division oversaw 22,260 investigations; 5,638 children in foster care; 6,298 DR cases; 3,130 in-home protective services cases; 1,480 supportive services cases; and 83 ICPC cases.

## Average Caseload

The average caseload statewide stood at 17 cases per worker at the end of SFY 2025. This is less than the Division’s goal of 20 or fewer cases per worker.

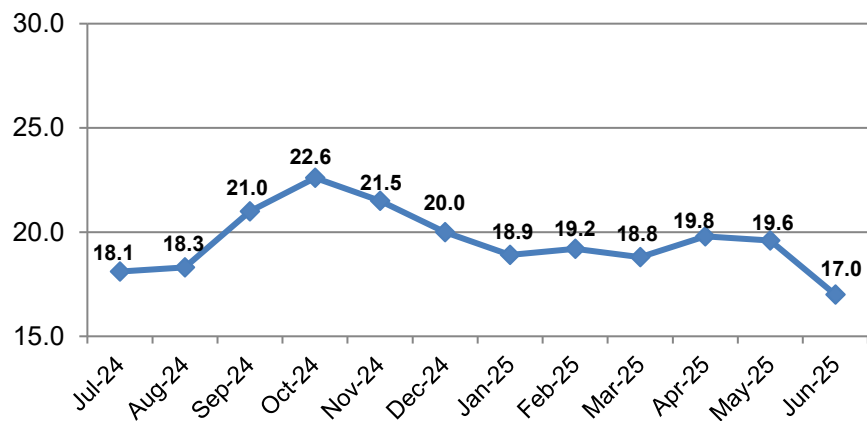
### Foster Homes and Beds

There were 1,362 licensed foster family homes open statewide at the end of SFY 2025, slightly less than the number open one year prior.

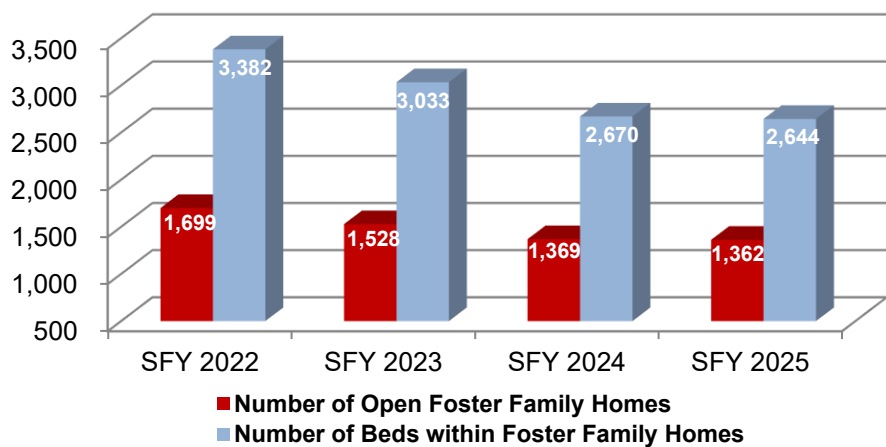
During SFY 2025, 1,073 new foster homes were opened and 1,028 were closed, resulting in a net gain of 45 homes.

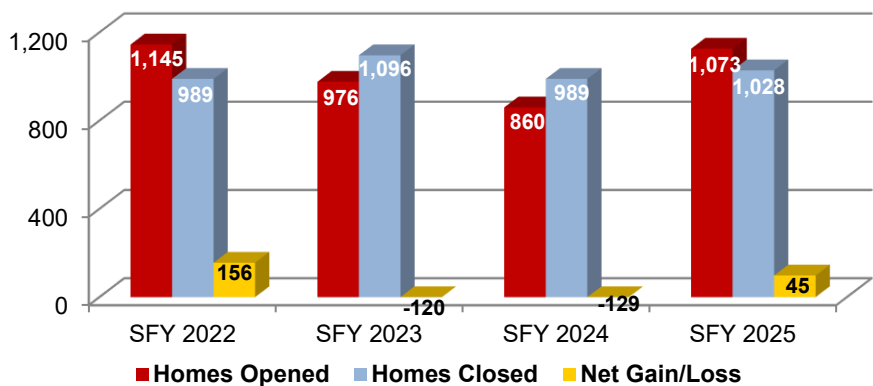
Average Caseload During SFY 2025

Number of Foster Family Homes Opened and Closed

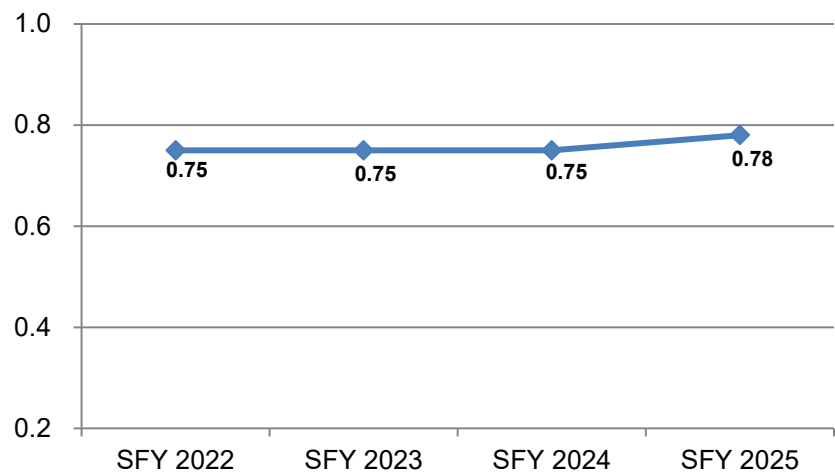

Foster Bed to Foster Child Ratio

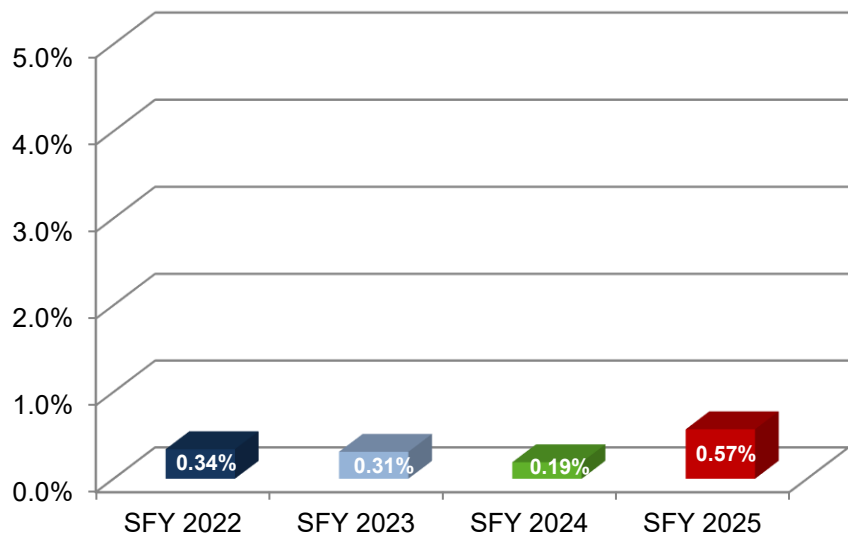


The ratio of licensed foster home beds to children in foster care was 0.78 at the end of the year, higher than the previous year.

The Division’s goal is to have at least one foster home bed available for each child in foster care.

Fifteen reports in which foster parents were identified as alleged offenders were determined to be true during the year. Based on the 2,621 foster homes active during that period, the percentage of foster families with a true report of maltreatment was 0.57 percent.

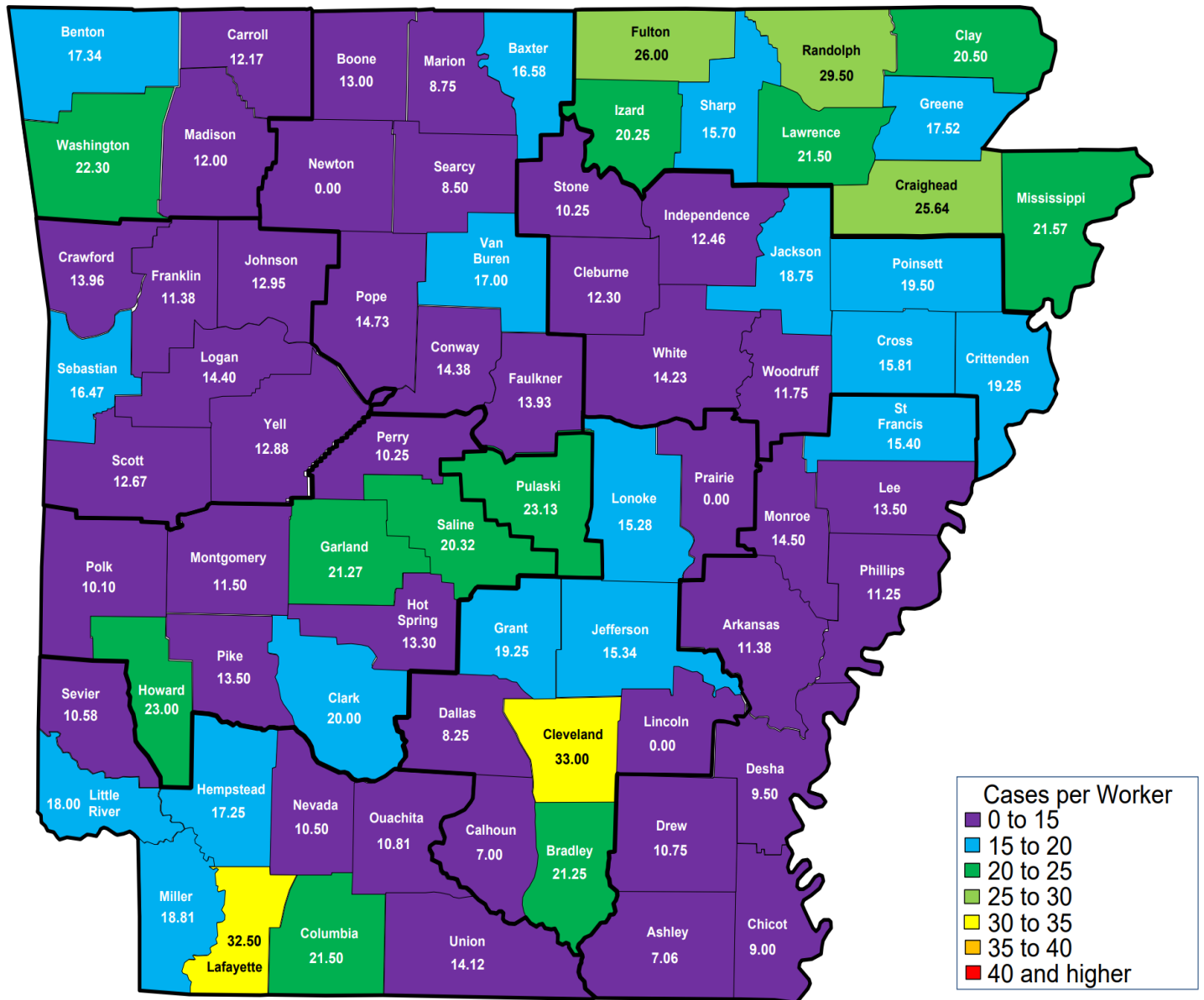

### Characteristics of Children in Foster Care Involved in Allegations of Maltreatment, SFY 2025

During SFY 2025 the Arkansas Child Abuse Hotline received 582 reports of alleged maltreatment involving children who were residing in foster care.

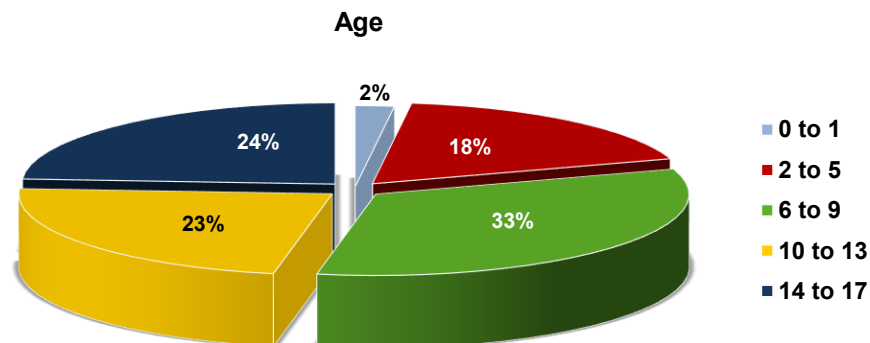
In 163 reports involving 205 children, foster parents<sup>4</sup> were identified as the alleged offenders. As shown by the following table, 15 of those reports were found to be true.<sup>5</sup> All 15 homes involved in those true reports have been closed.

All allegations of maltreatment concerning foster homes are investigated by the Crimes Against Children Division (CACD) of the Arkansas State Police. DCFS staff do not actively participate in the investigation of these reports. Allegations of maltreatment regarding foster homes require the agency to assess the safety of all children residing in the home.

The following charts display the characteristics of the 205 foster children involved in allegations of maltreatment, with foster parents as the alleged offenders.

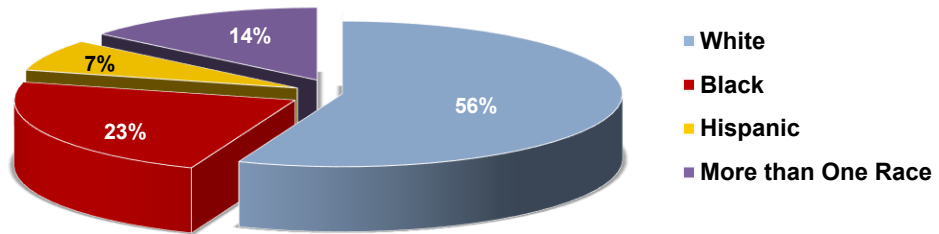

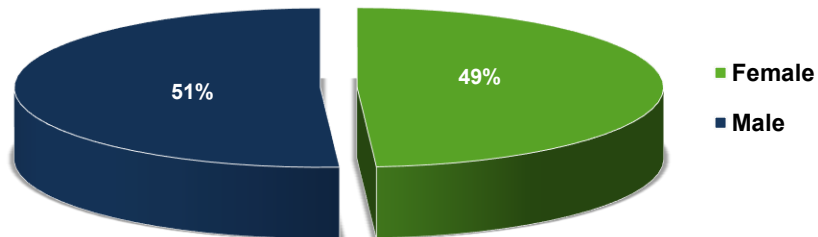

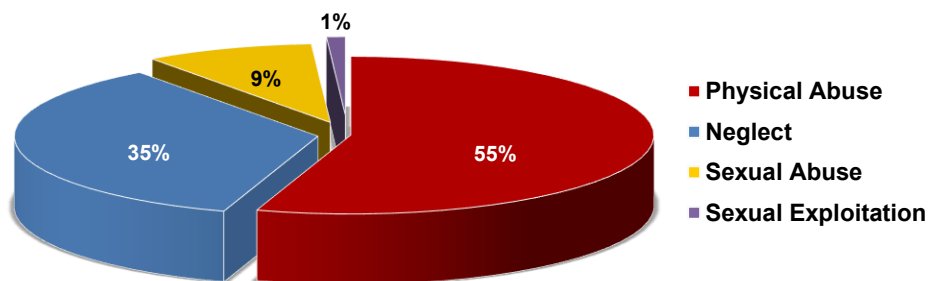
