23 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:
24

25 SECTION 1. REGULAR SALARIES. There is hereby established for the
26 Department of Human Services - Division of Youth Services for the 2003-2005
27 biennium, the following maximum number of regular employees whose salaries
28 shall be governed by the provisions of the Uniform Classification and
29 Compensation Act (Arkansas Code §§21-5-201 et seq.), or its successor, and
30 all laws amendatory thereto. Provided, however, that any position to which a
31 specific maximum annual salary is set out herein in dollars, shall be exempt
32 from the provisions of said Uniform Classification and Compensation Act. All
33 persons occupying positions authorized herein are hereby governed by the
34 provisions of the Regular Salaries Procedures and Restrictions Act (Arkansas
35 Code §21-5-101), or its successor.

19 SECTION 2. EXTRA HELP. There is hereby authorized, for the Department of
 20 Human Services - Division of Youth Services for the 2003-2005 biennium, the
 21 following maximum number of part-time or temporary employees, to be known as
 22 "Extra Help", payable from funds appropriated herein for such purposes:
 23 thirty-four (34) temporary or part-time employees, when needed, at rates of
 24 pay not to exceed those provided in the Uniform Classification and
 25 Compensation Act, or its successor, or this act for the appropriate
 26 classification.

28 SECTION 3. APPROPRIATION - ADMINISTRATION. There is hereby appropriated,
 29 to be payable from the funds and fund accounts as set out herein, to the
 30 Department of Human Services - Division of Youth Services for the biennial
 31 period ending June 30, 2005, the following:

13 SECTION 6. SPECIAL LANGUAGE. NOT TO BE INCORPORATED INTO THE ARKANSAS
 14 CODE NOR PUBLISHED SEPARATELY AS SPECIAL, LOCAL AND TEMPORARY LAW. YOUTH
 15 SERVICES - COMMUNITY-BASED RESIDENTIAL PROGRAMS - RESTRICTIONS. The
 16 Department of Human Services shall not contract or pay for community-based
 17 residential programs within any municipality to house unrelated persons who
 18 have been adjudicated delinquent of an act that would constitute a Class A
 19 felony or higher or of a sexual offense or convicted of a Class A felony or
 20 higher or sexual offense until the following conditions have been met:

- 21 1. Residents within one thousand (1,000) feet of the proposed location of the
- 22 facility shall be notified by mail;
- 23 2. A public hearing shall be conducted in the community of the proposed
- 24 location of the facility by the contract provider at least ten (10) days in
- 25 advance of the contract's effective date. Notice of the hearing shall be
- 26 made by mail to each of the residents within 1,000 feet of the proposed
- 27 location of the facility. The notification requirement shall not apply to
- 28 already existing facilities at already existing locations.

29 Provided further, upon establishment of such facilities within a
 30 particular municipality, the contract provider and the Department shall
 31 establish and implement a system to receive and respond to complaints and
 32 questions from residents of such municipality. In the event the Department
 33 and the provider fail to provide satisfactory communication as provided in
 34 this section to the residents, such facility may be declared a public
 35 nuisance by the municipality.

36 The provisions of this section shall be in effect only from ~~July 1, 2001~~

1 July 1, 2003 through ~~June 30, 2003~~ June 30, 2005.

2
3 SECTION 7. SPECIAL LANGUAGE. NOT TO BE INCORPORATED INTO THE ARKANSAS
4 CODE NOR PUBLISHED SEPARATELY AS SPECIAL, LOCAL AND TEMPORARY LAW. TRANSFER
5 OF FUNDS FOR THE JUVENILE OMBUDSMAN PROGRAM. The Department of Human
6 Services shall provide funding in an amount not to exceed \$300,000 for each
7 fiscal year of the biennial period ending ~~June 30, 2003~~ June 30, 2005 for the
8 Juvenile Ombudsman Program described in ACA 16-87-216. Upon request by the
9 Executive Director of the Arkansas Public Defender Commission, the Chief
10 Fiscal Officer of the State shall transfer an amount not to exceed \$300,000
11 for each year of the biennial period ending ~~June 30, 2003~~ June 30, 2005 from
12 an account designated by the Director of the Department of Human Services to
13 the State Central Services Fund as a direct revenue to fund the Juvenile
14 Ombudsman Program.

15
16 SECTION 8. SPECIAL LANGUAGE. NOT TO BE INCORPORATED INTO THE ARKANSAS
17 CODE NOR PUBLISHED SEPARATELY AS SPECIAL, LOCAL AND TEMPORARY LAW. TRANSFER
18 OF FUNDS FOR LOCAL JUVENILE DETENTION FACILITIES. The Chief Fiscal Officer
19 of the State shall transfer funds in an amount of \$400,000 for each fiscal
20 year of the biennial period ending ~~June 30, 2003~~ June 30, 2005 from the
21 Department of Human Services – Youth Services Fund Account to the Juvenile
22 Detention Facilities Operating Fund to fund the appropriation to the
23 Department of Finance and Administration – Disbursing Officer for grants for
24 operating expenses of local juvenile detention facilities.

25
26 The amount of the funds transferred in each fiscal year of the biennial
27 period ended ~~June 30, 2003~~ June 30, 2005 may be adjusted upon request of the
28 Director of the Department of Human Services on a pro-rata basis with any
29 reductions provided in the Revenue Stabilization Law from the July 1 Official
30 Forecast of general revenue funding for the Division of Youth Services.

31
32 SECTION 9. COMPLIANCE WITH OTHER LAWS. Disbursement of funds authorized
33 by this act shall be limited to the appropriation for such agency and funds
34 made available by law for the support of such appropriations; and the
35 restrictions of the State Purchasing Law, the General Accounting and
36 Budgetary Procedures Law, the Revenue Stabilization Law, the Regular Salary

1 Procedures and Restrictions Act, or their successors, and other fiscal
 2 control laws of this State, where applicable, and regulations promulgated by
 3 the Department of Finance and Administration, as authorized by law, shall be
 4 strictly complied with in disbursement of said funds.

5
 6 SECTION 10. LEGISLATIVE INTENT. It is the intent of the General Assembly
 7 that any funds disbursed under the authority of the appropriations contained
 8 in this act shall be in compliance with the stated reasons for which this act
 9 was adopted, as evidenced by the Agency Requests, Executive Recommendations
 10 and Legislative Recommendations contained in the budget manuals prepared by
 11 the Department of Finance and Administration, letters, or summarized oral
 12 testimony in the official minutes of the Arkansas Legislative Council or
 13 Joint Budget Committee which relate to its passage and adoption.

14
 15 SECTION 11. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is found and determined by the General
 16 Assembly, that the Constitution of the State of Arkansas prohibits the
 17 appropriation of funds for more than a two (2) year period; that the
 18 effectiveness of this Act on July 1, 2003 is essential to the operation of
 19 the agency for which the appropriations in this Act are provided, and that in
 20 the event of an extension of the Regular Session, the delay in the effective
 21 date of this Act beyond July 1, 2003 could work irreparable harm upon the
 22 proper administration and provision of essential governmental programs.
 23 Therefore, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this Act being
 24 necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and
 25 safety shall be in full force and effect from and after July 1, 2003.
