34	<u>(1)(A) "Arti</u>	ficial intelligence" means a machi	ine-based system			
35	that can make decisions,	recommendations, or predictions ba	ased on a set of			
36	objectives.					

1	(B) "Artificial intelligence" includes a machine-based				
2	system that uses human and machine inputs in order to perceive environments,				
3	analyze environments, and formulate opinions;				
4	(2) "Digital citizenship" means the application of the standards				
5	of appropriate, responsible, and healthy online behavior, including the				
6	ability to access, analyze, evaluate, create, and act on all forms of digital				
7	communication;				
8	(3) "Digital wellness" means the physical and emotional health				
9	impacts of media use, with attention to the development of conscious,				
10	balanced usage of media that aligns with an individual's goals for his or her				
11	health and well-being;				
12	(4)(A) "Information literacy" means a subdomain of media				
13	literacy that ensures an individual is able to recognize when information is				
14	needed and locate, evaluate, and effectively utilize the needed information.				
15	(B) "Information literacy" includes learning to ask				
16	questions regarding whether a source is legitimate and appropriate based on				
17	the information that is needed;				
18	(5)(A) "Media literacy" means the ability to:				
19	(i) Decode media messages, including the systems in				
20	which media messages exist;				
21	(ii) Assess the influence of media messages on				
22	thoughts, feelings, behaviors, perceptions, beliefs, health, and society; and				
23	(iii) Use and create media messages to provide				
24	information, send a message, or tell a story in a way that is thoughtful,				
25	conscientious, safe, and responsible.				
26	(B) "Media literacy" includes digital citizenship, digital				
27	wellness, information literacy, news literacy, and social media literacy;				
28	(6)(A) "News literacy" means a subdomain of media literacy that				
29	emphasizes knowledge of journalistic practices and the news media industry.				
30	(B) "News literacy" includes the ability to determine the				
31	credibility and reliability of news and other information and to recognize				
32	the standards of fact-based journalism to know what to trust, share, and act				
33	on; and				
34	(7) "Social media literacy" means the application of digital				
35	citizenship and digital wellness to address physical and mental health				
36	implications of social media use, including positive and negative mental and				

1	emotional health implications of viewing certain social media content and all				
2	aspects of safety and wellness related to the use of social media.				
3	(c)(1) By the 2026-2027 school year, the Division of Elementary and				
4	Secondary Education shall establish kindergarten through grade twelve (K-12)				
5	digital media standards.				
6	(2)(A) Digital media standards shall be embedded into existing				
7	English language arts and library media standards.				
8	(B) The division shall consider whether to embed digital				
9	media standards into other existing content standards.				
10	(d) The digital media standards required under this section shall				
11	include instruction on:				
12	(1) Digital citizenship, including media literacy instruction,				
13	internet safety instruction, and artificial intelligence usage instruction;				
14	(2) Digital wellness, including without limitation information				
15	on the:				
16	(A) Positive effects of social media, including				
17	communicating, researching, and collaborating with others and building				
18	businesses and relationships;				
19	(B) Negative effects of social media on mental health,				
20	including addiction;				
21	(C) Distribution of misinformation on social media;				
22	(D) Potential of social media to manipulate behavior; and				
23	(E) Permanency of sharing materials and information				
24	online;				
25	(3) Internet safety, including best practices to:				
26	(A) Maintain personal security; and				
27	(B) Identify cyberbullying, predatory behavior, and human				
28	trafficking on the internet;				
29	(4) Social media literacy; and				
30	(5) The proper use of artificial intelligence.				
31	(e) The division shall:				
32	(1) Create or endorse a curriculum to implement kindergarten				
33	through grade twelve (K-12) digital media standards required under this				
34	section; and				
35	(2) Establish or endorse parental resources that support the				
36	implementation of kindergarten through grade twelve (K-12) digital media				

1	standards	required	under	this	section.
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
