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17	BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:	
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19	SECTION 1. DO NOT CODIFY. Legislative findings and intent.	
20	(a) The General Assembly finds that:	1 :-
21	(1) Religious freedom is a cornerstone of our democracy an	<u>a 1s</u>
22	essential to the dignity and freedom of every individual;	
23 24	(2) Arkansas Constitution Article 14, § 1, provides that	1. af a
25	"Intelligence and virtue being the safeguards of liberty and the bulwar free and good government, the State shall ever maintain a general, suit	
26	and efficient system of free public schools and shall adopt all suitable	
27	means to secure to the people the advantages and opportunities of	<u>u</u>

29	(3) An important advantage and essential opportunity of a	svstem
30	of free public schools is for students to develop a virtuous lifestyle	-
31	by deeply held, meaningful values;	
32	(4) Religious worldviews hold an important place in overal	1
33	human thought and philosophy;	_
34	(5) Religious freedom provides an environment and opportun	<u>ity</u>
35	for students to be exposed to worldviews that form the basis for civili	zation
36	and thought;	

1	(6) Religious freedom at public schools is a right that is
2	protected by state and federal law; and
3	(7) The United States Supreme Court has held in "Tinker v. Des
4	Moines", that neither students nor teachers "shed their constitutional rights
5	to freedom of speech or expression at the schoolhouse gate".
6	(b) It is the intent of the General Assembly to:
7	(1) Inform Arkansas residents regarding religious protections
8	and liberties;
9	(2) Ensure that this act serves only as a guide to clarify
10	religious rights at public schools, rather than as an exhaustive list of
11	religious rights at public schools; and
12	(3) Affirm that students and public school employees retain many
13	unlisted rights by virtue of their God-given freedoms, which extend beyond
14	those rights explicitly enumerated in this act.
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16	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code Title 6, Chapter 10, Subchapter 1, is amended
17	to add an additional section to read as follows:
18	6-10-140. Religious Rights at Public Schools Act of 2025.
19	(a) This section shall be known and may be cited as the "Religious
20	Rights at Public Schools Act of 2025".
21	(b) At the beginning of each school year, each public school district
22	and open-enrollment public charter school shall provide each enrolled student
23	and individual employed by the public school district or open-enrollment
24	public charter school with a copy of this act.
25	(c) Under the First Amendment to the United States Constitution and
26	United States Supreme Court case law interpreting the First Amendment to the
27	United States Constitution, a student enrolled in a public school district or
28	an open-enrollment public charter school shall retain broad religious
29	freedom, which includes without limitation the right to:
30	(1) Pray silently or aloud, individually or in groups, at any
31	time when the student is permitted to speak freely and engage in discussions
32	of the student's own choosing;
33	(2) Pray by assembling on the property of the student's public
34	school district or open-enrollment public charter school in the same manner
35	that students are allowed to speak and assemble on the property of the
36	student's public school district or open-enrollment public charter school for

1	other activities;
2	(3) Promote religious activities on the property of the
3	student's public school district or open-enrollment public charter school in
4	the same manner that other activities are promoted;
5	(4) Display, print, recite, or discuss religious figures,
6	religious texts, and religious beliefs in the student's public school
7	district or open-enrollment public charter school assignments in which there
8	is student discretion in choosing topics or people of interest;
9	(5) Give a Bible or other religious text to any other person at
10	the student's public school district or open-enrollment public charter school
11	in the same manner that the student is allowed to give away other books or
12	texts;
13	(6) Individually or in groups conduct religious observances such
14	as speaking, singing, reading, or praying at times when students are free to
15	voluntarily converse and interact;
16	(7) Form and participate in religious clubs, groups, or
17	associations in the same manner that students form and participate in other
18	clubs, groups, or associations;
19	(8) Invite and host members of the clergy or other religious
20	leaders to the student's public school district or open-enrollment public
21	charter school in the same manner that other persons who are not enrolled in
22	the public school district or open-enrollment public charter school are
23	allowed to be present;
24	(9) Express a religious viewpoint in the same manner as other
25	viewpoints may be expressed in the student's public school district or open-
26	enrollment public charter school academic assignments, activities, speech, or
27	other expressions;
28	(10) Pray silently during any moment of silence observed during
29	the school day or at the student's public school district or open-enrollment
30	<pre>public charter school activities;</pre>
31	(11) Display and discuss the motto of the United States at the
32	student's public school district or open-enrollment public charter school;
33	(12) Read, discuss, and post documents of historical
34	significance that are of a religious nature or contain religious quotes or
35	references;

(13) Have a Bible or other religious text at the student's

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1	public school district or open-enrollment public charter school in the same
2	manner that the student is allowed to have other books or texts at the
3	student's public school district or open-enrollment public charter school;
4	<u>and</u>
5	(14) Read a Bible or other religious text at the student's
6	public school district or open-enrollment public charter school in the same
7	manner that the student is allowed to read other books or texts at the
8	student's public school district or open-enrollment public charter school.
9	(d) Under the First Amendment to the United States Constitution and
10	United States Supreme Court case law interpreting the First Amendment to the
11	United States Constitution, an individual employed by a public school
12	district or an open-enrollment public charter school shall retain broad
13	religious freedom, which includes without limitation the right to:
14	(1) Pray silently during any moment of silence observed during
15	the school day or at the individual's public school district or open-
16	enrollment public charter school activities;
17	(2) Display and discuss the motto of the United States at the
18	individual's public school district or open-enrollment public charter school;
19	(3) Read, discuss, and post documents of historical significance
20	that are of a religious nature or contain religious quotes or references;
21	(4) Have a Bible or other religious text at the individual's
22	public school district or open-enrollment public charter school in the same
23	manner that the individual is allowed to have other books or texts at the
24	individual's public school district or open-enrollment public charter school;
25	<u>and</u>
26	(5) Read a Bible or other religious text at the individual's
27	public school district or open-enrollment public charter school in the same
28	manner that the individual is allowed to read other books or texts at the
29	individual's public school district or open-enrollment public charter school.
30	(e) A public school district and an open-enrollment public charter
31	<pre>school may:</pre>
32	(1) Have Bibles and other religious texts in public school
33	libraries, classrooms, and other places where books or texts are available to
34	public school district or open-enrollment public charter school students or
35	individuals employed by the public school district or open-enrollment public
36	charter school; and

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
